Senate Bill 167 (Senator Ruben)
Judicial Proceedings

Vehicle Laws - Seat Belt Offenses - Enforcement

This bill makes failure to wear a seat belt a primary offense by repealing current law that permits a police officer to enforce the mandatory seat belt law only as a secondary offense when the driver of the vehicle is detained for a suspected violation of another provision of the law.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: Indeterminate increase in general fund revenues under the penalty provision applicable to this offense under the Maryland Vehicle Law (maximum \$500 fine). Given the large number of drivers who do not wear seat belts, the revenue increase could be significant.

Expenditures would not be affected as enforcement by the State Police could be handled with existing resources.

Local Effect: None. Enforcement by local law enforcement agencies could be handled with existing resources.

Small Business Effect: None. The bill would not directly affect small businesses.
