- 3 FOR the purpose of altering the definition of "practice massage therapy" to prevent
- 4 the practice of massage therapy by uncertified persons; expanding the scope of
- 5 prohibited actions for persons practicing massage therapy without being
- 6 certified; and generally relating to the practice of massage therapy by
- 7 uncertified persons.
- 8 BY repealing and reenacting, with amendments,

- 13 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
- 14 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

15 Article - Health Occupations

16 3-5A-01.

- 17 (a) In this subtitle the following words have the meanings indicated.
- 18 (b) "Board" means the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners.
- 19 (c) "Certificate" means, unless the context requires otherwise, a certificate
- 20 issued by the Board to practice massage therapy.
- 21 (d) "Certified massage therapist" means an individual who is certified by the
- 22 Board to practice massage therapy.
- 23 (e) "Massage Therapy Advisory Committee" means the Committee established
- 24 under § 3-5A-04 of this subtitle.
- 25 (f) "Massage therapy" means the use of manual techniques on soft
- 26 tissues of the human body including effleurage (stroking), petrissage (kneading),

- 1 tapotement (tapping), stretching, compression, vibration, and friction, with or
- 2 without the aid of heat limited to hot packs and heating pads, cold water, or
- 3 nonlegend topical applications, for the purpose of improving circulation, enhancing
- 4 muscle relaxation, relieving muscular pain, reducing stress, or promoting health and
- 5 well-being.
- 6 "Massage therapy" does not include:
- 7 (i) The diagnosis or treatment of illness, disease, or injury; or
- 8 (ii) The adjustment, manipulation, or mobilization of any of the
- 9 articulations of the osseous structures of the body or spine.
- 10 (3) The provisions of paragraph (2) of this subsection do not preclude the
- 11 application of the modalities described in paragraph (1) of this subsection to an
- 12 individual who has an injury.
- 13 (g) "Practice massage therapy" means to engage professionally and for
- 14 compensation in massage therapy [while representing oneself to be a certified
- 15 massage therapist].
- 16 3-5A-10.
- 17 (a) Except as otherwise provided in this subtitle, an individual may not
- 18 practice, attempt to practice, or offer to practice massage therapy, MASSAGE,
- 19 MYOTHERAPY, OR ANY SYNONYM OR DERIVATION OF THESE TERMS in this State
- 20 unless certified by the Board.
- 21 (b) An individual who is not certified as a certified massage therapist under
- 22 this subtitle may not advertise or claim by title, abbreviation, sign, card, or any other
- 23 representation that the individual practices massage, massage therapy, myotherapy,
- 24 or any synonym or derivation of these terms.
- 25 (c) Any individual who violates a provision of this subsection is guilty of a
- 26 misdemeanor and on conviction shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$5,000 or
- 27 imprisonment for not more than 1 year, or both.
- 28 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
- 29 October 1, 1999.
