12 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 13 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That, notwithstanding any provision of Chapter 147 of the Acts of the General Assembly of 1996, the Secretary of Health and Mental Hygiene, prior to July 1, [1999] 2000, may not impose any sanctions under that Act, or any regulation adopted under it, with respect to an assisted living program, as defined in § 19 801 § 19-1801 of the Health-General Article, that provides services to 15 or fewer individuals, unless the actions of an assisted living program that provides services to 15 or fewer individuals have: (1) caused actual physical or emotional harm to a

- $1\,$  resident in the program; or (2) placed a resident in the program at risk of physical or  $2\,$  emotional harm.
- 3 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 4 June 1, 1999.
