## **FISCAL NOTE**

Senate Bill 321 (Senator Teitelbaum. *et al.*)

Judicial Proceedings

Vehicle Laws - Driving While License Suspended, Revoked, or Canceled - Suspension of Registration

This bill requires that the Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA) suspend, for up to 90 days, the registration of a vehicle operated by an individual whose license is suspended, revoked, or canceled. The registered owner must return the registration card and license plates to the MVA and may obtain special 90-day temporary registration and plates for a fee not to exceed \$50. The registered owner may request a hearing to show cause why the registration should not be suspended. If a hearing office finds in favor of the owner, the MVA must register the vehicle and issue new license plates at no charge.

## **Fiscal Summary**

**State Effect:** Transportation Trust Fund (TTF) expenditures could increase by \$53,200 in FY 2000 exclusive of administrative hearings and computer programming. Future years reflect annualization and inflation. Indeterminate effect on revenues.

## **Fiscal Analysis**

**State Expenditures:** Under existing law, the MVA must suspend the registration of a vehicle if the driver was driving on a license that was suspended, canceled, or revoked due to drunk or drugged driving, refusal to take a chemical test, or vehicular manslaughter. In fiscal 1998, the MVA suspended 1,329 registrations under the existing provision. Also in fiscal 1998, there were 124 citations issued for driving on a canceled license, 25,424 citations issued for driving on a suspended license, and 4,258 citations issued for driving on a revoked license.

While the MVA could handle some of the increased workload with existing resources, it is expected that the MVA will require 2 additional customer service representatives to process suspensions, issue temporary registrations, and reissue permanent registrations. TTF expenditures could increase by an estimated \$53,200 in fiscal 2000, which accounts for the bill's October 1, 1999 effective date. It includes salaries, fringe benefits, one-time start-up costs, and ongoing operating expenses. Future year expenditures reflect: (1) full salaries with 3.5% annual increases and 3% employee turnover; and (2) 1% annual increases in ongoing operating expenses. Additional administrative costs, such as postage costs, will increase by an indeterminate amount to notify those who are subject to a registration suspension.

The owner of the vehicle may request a hearing to show cause why the registration should not be suspended. It costs the MVA approximately \$88 in reimbursable funds for each MVA hearing conducted by the Office of Administrative Hearings. The number of hearings that may be administered to contest registration suspensions is uncertain. To the extent that an individual with a suspended license requests a hearing, TTF expenditures could increase.

The MVA advises that computer programming expenditures could increase by an estimated \$147,400 to modify the computer programs to expand the registration suspension system. The Department of Legislative Services (DLS) advises that if other legislation is passed requiring computer reprogramming changes, economies of scale could be realized. This would reduce computer programming costs associated with this bill and other legislation affecting the MVA system. Further, DLS advises that the increased computer expenditure is simply an estimate and the MVA may be able to handle the changes with either less money than it estimates or existing resources.

The expenditures of the District Court will not be affected. The court already notifies the MVA of such violations and includes the registration number of the vehicle in the notification.

**State Revenues:** Those individuals who are issued a 90-day temporary registration will be refunded the portion of the initial registration fee if more than a year remains on the

registration. They will then be required to pay a fee of up to \$50 to the MVA to obtain the temporary registration. The fee will mitigate any costs associated with producing the temporary registration plates. In order to be reregistered after the 90-day period, the owner of the vehicle must pay a full registration fee. For Class A passenger cars, the 2-year registration fee is \$70. TTF revenues should increase depending upon the number of temporary registrations that are issued. The impact of the registration fee refund and subsequent renewal of permanent registrations on TTF revenues is not expected to be significant.

The bill will increase the number of drivers who have a suspended registration. This may lead to an increase in fine revenue due to more violations of driving on a suspended registration. In fiscal 1998, there were 5,787 citations issued for driving with a suspended registration.

The Office of Administrative Hearings imposes a \$15 filing fee per case that is deposited into the general fund. Depending upon the number of requested hearings, general fund revenue could increase. However, any such increase is assumed to be minimal.
