Senate Bill 12 (Senator Green)

Judicial Proceedings

#### **Criminal Procedure - Service of Process**

This bill expands the locations within which designated employees of local detention centers may serve criminal process. Under current law, an administrator of a local detention center may designate employees to serve criminal summonses, warrants, and charging documents within the detention center. The bill adds any police facility, central or regional booking site, and any other area that is staffed and controlled by employees of the local detention center as locations within which designated employees can serve process.

The bill takes effect June 1, 1999.

## **Fiscal Summary**

State Effect: None. The bill would not directly affect State finances.

Local Effect: Efficiency savings for local law enforcement agencies. No effect on revenues.

**Small Business Effect:** None.

## **Fiscal Analysis**

**Local Effect:** Local corrections employees are used at booking sites, other police facilities, and occasionally medical facilities in addition to detention centers. These workers are local government employees, except in the case of Baltimore City Detention Center, where the employees are paid by the State. This bill would allow corrections employees to serve court documents in all facilities in which they work, eliminating the need to take police officers away from their other duties to perform this function. The number of court documents to be served in outlying facilities is not expected to be large. This bill is not expected to result in a

reduction in funding for law enforcement personnel, but there would be a more efficient use of existing personnel.

Any additional workload and/or training for corrections employees could be handled with existing resources.
