1	A Senate Joint Resolution concerning
2	Department of Transportation - Mass Transit - Study of Discounted Fares
3 4 5 6 7 8 9	FOR the purpose of requesting the Maryland Department of Transportation to conduct a certain study of the various fare discounts that are available to students and other mass transit riders in Washington, D.C. and Baltimore City and to evaluate the costs and feasibility of providing such discounts to mass transit riders in the Washington Metropolitan area; requiring the Department to report to the General Assembly on or before a certain date; and generally relating to mass transit fares.
12	WHEREAS, Mass transit systems provide energy-efficient transportation, contribute to a reduction in traffic congestion on the highways, and promote clean air, and it is, therefore, in the best interest of the State to encourage the widespread use of mass transit; and
	WHEREAS, Various programs currently provide discounted fares to students and other "special-need" individuals who use mass transit in Washington, D.C. and Baltimore City; and
17 18	WHEREAS, Fares charged for the use of mass transit should be reasonably equitable and designed to encourage, rather than discourage, mass transit use; and
	WHEREAS, There currently exists a lack of consistency with respect to the fares charged and the discounts available to students and others who seek to use mass transit facilities in different regions of the State; now, therefore, be it
22	RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the

23 Maryland Department of Transportation is requested to conduct a study of the 24 various fare discounts that are available to mass transit riders in Washington, D.C. 25 and Baltimore City and to evaluate the costs and feasibility of providing such

- 1 discounts to mass transit riders throughout the Washington Metropolitan region; and

- RESOLVED, That, as part of the study, the Department of Transportation shall 4 consider:
- 5 (1) Options for providing fare discounts to all student users of mass
- 6 transit services in the Washington Metropolitan area, including riders of MARC
- 7 trains, Metrobus and Metrorail, Ride-On buses in Montgomery County, "The Bus" in
- 8 Prince George's County, and CTC buses serving the City of Laurel and surrounding
- 9 areas:
- 10 (2) Expanding into other areas of the State programs such as the Mass
- 11 Transit Administration's College 33 Pass program, which currently provides
- 12 discounted fares only to Baltimore area college students; and
- 13 (3) The feasibility of providing discounted fares for all mass transit
- 14 riders during off-peak hours and for student riders at all times, including weekends
- 15 and evenings; and be it further
- RESOLVED, That, on or before December 15, 2000, the Department of
- 17 Transportation shall submit a report to the General Assembly, in accordance with §
- 18 2-1246 of the State Government Article on the results of the study; and be it further
