<u>number of principals in certain counties</u>; requiring the State Board each county

10 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF

11 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

14 (A) (1) IN THIS SECTION THE FOLLOWING WORDS HAVE THE MEANINGS 15 INDICATED.

16 (2) "BALTIMORE METROPOLITAN AREA" MEANS BALTIMORE CITY AND 17 BALTIMORE, CARROLL, AND HARFORD COUNTIES.

18 (3) "EASTERN SHORE" MEANS CAROLINE, CECIL, DORCHESTER, KENT,
 19 QUEEN ANNE'S, SOMERSET, TALBOT, WICOMICO, AND WORCESTER COUNTIES.

20 (4) "LOCAL RECONSTITUTION SCHOOL" MEANS AN INDIVIDUAL SCHOOL
21 THAT IS NOT SATISFACTORILY MEETING STATE STANDARDS NOR PROGRESSING
22 TOWARDS STATE STANDARDS AND IS GIVEN A PROBATIONARY PERIOD DURING
23 WHICH THE SCHOOL AND THE COUNTY BOARD ARE GIVEN AN OPPORTUNITY TO
24 ENACT CHANGES WHILE BEING MONITORED BY THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

25 (5) (3) "PROGRAM" MEANS THE PRINCIPAL TRAINING PILOT PROGRAM.

26 (6) "SOUTHERN MARYLAND" MEANS ANNE ARUNDEL, CALVERT, 27 CHARLES, AND ST. MARY'S COUNTIES.

28 (7) "STATE BOARD" MEANS THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

29 (8) "THE FIVE REGIONS OF MARYLAND" MEANS THE BALTIMORE

30 METROPOLITAN AREA, THE EASTERN SHORE, SOUTHERN MARYLAND, THE

31 WASHINGTON, D.C. METROPOLITAN AREA, AND WESTERN MARYLAND.

32 (9) "WASHINGTON, D.C. METROPOLITAN AREA OF MARYLAND" MEANS
 33 HOWARD, MONTGOMERY, AND PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTIES.

34 (10) "WESTERN MARYLAND" MEANS ALLEGANY, FREDERICK, GARRETT, 35 AND WASHINGTON COUNTIES.

HOUSE BILL 7 (B) THERE IS A PRINCIPAL TRAINING PILOT PROGRAM. (C) THE STATE BOARD SHALL AWARD INCENTIVE FUNDING UNDER THE (1)3 PROGRAM TO PROVIDE SCHOOL PRINCIPALS WITH INSTRUCTION AND TRAINING IN **4 THE FOLLOWING AREAS:** (I) SCHOOL FINANCIAL AND PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT; (II) CORE ACADEMIC STANDARDS; (III) CURRICULUM FRAMEWORKS AND INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS 8 ALIGNED TO THE STATE ACADEMIC STANDARDS; (IV) THE USE OF STUDENT ASSESSMENT INSTRUMENTS AND 10 SPECIFIC WAYS OF MASTERING THE USE OF ASSESSMENT DATA FROM THE 11 MARYLAND SCHOOL PERFORMANCE ASSESSMENT PROGRAM: (V) THE USE OF SCHOOL MANAGEMENT TECHNOLOGY TO IMPROVE 13 STUDENT PERFORMANCE; AND INSTRUCTIONAL LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT STRATEGIES (VI)15 REGARDING THE USE OF INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY TO IMPROVE STUDENT 16 PERFORMANCE. ADDITIONAL INSTRUCTION AND TRAINING AREAS THAT MAY BE (2)18 CONSIDERED TO IMPROVE STUDENT LEARNING AND ACHIEVEMENT BASED UPON 19 THE NEEDS OF PARTICIPATING PRINCIPALS INCLUDE THEORIES OF LEARNING, 20 MOTIVATING STUDENT LEARNING, COLLABORATION, CONFLICT RESOLUTION, 21 DIVERSITY, PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT, EMPLOYEE RELATIONS, AND THE CREATION 22 OF EFFECTIVE LEARNING AND WORKPLACE ENVIRONMENTS. ANY A PUBLIC SCHOOL, GROUP OF SCHOOLS, COUNTY BOARD, OR (D) (1)24 GROUP OF COUNTY BOARDS IS ELIGIBLE TO APPLY FOR INCENTIVE FUNDING UNDER 25 THE PROGRAM. TO RECEIVE INCENTIVE FUNDING, AN APPLICANT, INDIVIDUALLY OR (2)27 IN PARTNERSHIP WITH ONE OR MORE INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION OR 28 OTHER EDUCATION ENTITIES, SHALL SUBMIT A PLAN TO THE STATE BOARD. THE PLAN SHALL INCLUDE: (3) (I) A DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN, INCLUDING CURRICULA; (II)A LISTING OF ANTICIPATED EXPENSES: AND A DESCRIPTION OF HOW THE PLAN ADDRESSES THE AREAS (III) 33 SPECIFIED IN SUBSECTION (C) OF THIS SECTION.

THE STATE BOARD SHALL APPROVE OR DISAPPROVE AN APPLICANT'S 34 (4)35 PLAN.

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1 (E) A PLAN SHALL PROVIDE AT LEAST 40 HOURS OF TRAINING.

2 (F) (1) INCENTIVE FUNDING AMOUNTS MAY NOT EXCEED \$1,500 PER 3 PRINCIPAL.

4 (2) THE STATE SHALL PAY THE INCENTIVE FUNDING TO AN APPLICANT 5 ONCE THE APPLICANT'S PLAN IS APPROVED BY THE STATE BOARD.

6 (3) FOR EACH \$1,500 THAT IS RECEIVED, AN APPLICANT SHALL PROVIDE 7 \$500 IN MATCHING FUNDS THAT SHALL BE USED FOR COSTS OF A PLAN.

8 (4) ANY COMBINATION OF LOCAL, FEDERAL, OR PRIVATE RESOURCES
9 OR CONTRIBUTIONS MAY BE USED FOR THE APPLICANT'S MATCH.

10 (G) (1) THE PROGRAM IS LIMITED TO <u>100</u> PRINCIPALS FROM ONE COUNTY 11 FROM EACH OF THE FIVE REGIONS OF MARYLAND.

(2) THE STATE BOARD SHALL CHOOSE THE COUNTIES AND THE
 PRINCIPALS FOR EACH COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT SHALL CHOOSE THREE
 PRINCIPALS FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE PROGRAM.

15 (H) (3) IT IS THE INTENT OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY THAT THE STATE
 16 BOARD GIVE THE STATE SUPERINTENDENT SHALL CHOOSE THE REMAINING 28
 17 PRINCIPALS, GIVING THE HIGHEST PRIORITY TO TRAINING PRINCIPALS ASSIGNED
 18 TO AND PRACTICING IN LOCAL RECONSTITUTION SCHOOLS.

19 (H) THE GOVERNOR SHALL INCLUDE FUNDS IN THE STATE BUDGET TO 20 IMPLEMENT THE PROGRAM.

(J) THE STATE BOARD SHALL REPORT TO THE SENATE BUDGET AND
 TAXATION COMMITTEE, SENATE EDUCATION, HEALTH, AND ENVIRONMENTAL
 AFFAIRS COMMITTEE, HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE, AND HOUSE WAYS AND
 MEANS COMMITTEE ON OR BEFORE JUNE 30, 2004, IN ACCORDANCE WITH § 2 1246 OF
 THE STATE GOVERNMENT ARTICLE, ASSESSING THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE
 PROGRAM. THE REPORT SHALL INCLUDE:

32 ASSESSMENT PROGRAM SCORES WITHIN THE PARTICIPATING COUNTIES FOR THE

33 YEAR BEFORE THE PRINCIPALS RECEIVED TRAINING AND FOR THE FIRST YEAR

34 AFTER THE PRINCIPALS COMPLETED THE TRAINING;

35 (4) INFORMATION DETAILING THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE PROGRAM,
 36 INCLUDING SURVEY DATA FROM PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS; AND

1 (5) INFORMATION DETAILING THE RETENTION RATE OF PRINCIPALS 2 WHO PARTICIPATED IN THE PROGRAM.
 <u>SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the State Board of</u> <u>Education shall report to the Senate Budget and Taxation Committee, Senate</u> <u>Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs Committee, House Appropriations</u> <u>Committee, and House Ways and Means Committee on or before June 30, 2004, in</u> <u>accordance with § 2-1246 of the State Government Article, assessing the effectiveness</u> <u>of the Principal Training Pilot Program established under this Act. The report shall</u> <u>include information regarding:</u>
10 (1) the jurisdictions in which principals who receive training under the pilot 11 program are employed;
 12 (2) the entities that receive funds for programs and the number of principals 13 that each entity trains under each program;
 <u>a comparison of Maryland School Performance Assessment Program scores</u> <u>within the participating counties for the year before the principals received training</u> <u>under the pilot program and for the first year after the principals completed the</u> <u>training;</u>
18(4)the effectiveness of the pilot program, including survey data from19participants in the pilot program; and
20 (5) the retention rate of principals who participate in the pilot program.
 SECTION 2. 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 2002. It shall remain effective for a period of 3 years and, at the end of June 30, 2005, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
