HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A House Joint Resolution concerning

2

Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month

3 FOR the purpose of designating September of each year as "Ovarian Cancer4 Awareness Month".

5 WHEREAS, Each year, while approximately 82,000 women in the United States 6 are diagnosed with cancers affecting the reproductive organs, ovarian cancer is the 7 most serious form of gynecologic cancers, killing approximately 40 women a day, 8 accounting for 4% of all cancers among women, and ranking fifth as a cause of their 9 deaths from cancer;

10 WHEREAS, Public health experts estimate that over 23,000 women in the 11 United States will be diagnosed with ovarian cancer in 2001 <u>2002</u>, with one woman 12 out of every 55 developing ovarian cancer at some point in her life;

WHEREAS, Public health experts estimate that over <u>approximately</u> 14,000
women in the United States will die from ovarian cancer in 2001 <u>2002</u>;

15 <u>WHEREAS</u>, Public health experts estimate that 200 women in the State of
 16 <u>Maryland will die from ovarian cancer in 2002;</u>

WHEREAS, Ovarian cancer is often referred to as the "silent killer" because the
symptoms are often subtle, vague, and easily confused with other ailments, making it
difficult to diagnose and thus allowing this lethal malignancy the opportunity to
spread through a woman's abdomen and beyond before being detected;

21 WHEREAS, Over 75% of women diagnosed with ovarian cancer are not 22 diagnosed until the cancer has spread beyond the ovaries, resulting in a 5-year

23 survival rate of only 15% to 20%;

WHEREAS, Early detection of ovarian cancer approaches a 95% survival rate,
 however, only 25% of all cases are diagnosed at this stage; and

3 WHEREAS, Because there is currently no effective, easy-to-use means of early

4 detection for ovarian cancer, knowledge, understanding, and an awareness of the

5 disease and its symptoms are every woman's best defense against ovarian cancer; 6 now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the month
of September in each year is designated as "Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month"; and

10 RESOLVED, That public health agencies are urged to develop strategies, 11 pamphlets, public service announcements, presentations, and a coordinated 12 campaign to increase public awareness and knowledge regarding this virulent

13 disease; and be it further

14 RESOLVED, That hospitals, health care providers, service organizations,
15 newspapers, advertisers, schools, and individuals are encouraged to participate fully
16 in this struggle to save lives through public education regarding ovarian cancer; and
