## A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

## Transportation - Vehicle Laws - Maximum Vehicle Width and Length

3 FOR the purpose of providing for the calculation of the width of a motor home or
4 travel trailer; authorizing the State Highway Administration and local 5 authorities to restrict the width of vehicles traveling on certain highways in 6 their jurisdiction under certain circumstances; requiring the State Highway 7 Administration and local authorities to post certain signs if the width of vehicles 8 is limited; increasing the maximum length of a publicly owned rigid bus or Class 9 M motor home when operated on certain highways or routes; increasing the 10 maximum length of a certain maxi-cube vehicle; and generally relating to 11 vehicle laws and maximum vehicle widths and lengths.

2 BY repealing and reenacting, with amendments, Article - Transportation Section 24-102 and 24-104.1 Annotated Code of Maryland (2002 Replacement Volume and 2004 Supplement)

SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
18 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

## Article - Transportation

20 24-102.
(a) (1) [For] EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN PARAGRAPH (2) OF THIS SUBSECTION, FOR purposes of this section, the width of a vehicle includes any load that it carries and shall be exclusive of safety and energy conservation devices, such as side mirrors, turn signal lamps, marker lamps, steps and handholds for entry and egress, flexible fender extensions, mudflaps and spray suppressant devices, and load-induced tire bulges; providing the equipment or device, other than mirrors, does not extend more than 3 inches on each side of the vehicle beyond the statutory width limitation. 9 operations, if the distance traveled with the load on the highways in this State is less 10 than 5 miles.

## 11 (c) (1) [A] EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN PARAGRAPH (2) OF THIS SUBSECTION,

 12 A vehicle may not be driven on any highway if the width of the vehicle exceeds [the 13 limits specified in this subsection] 102 INCHES unless:14 (i) It has a permit issued by the State Highway Administration 15 under § 24-112 of this subtitle; or

16 (ii) As to a highway under the jurisdiction of a local authority, it has 17 special permission from the local authority.

18 [(2) For a motor vehicle loaded with tobacco hogsheads or sod, the width
19 limit is 102 inches.

20 (3) For a bus, motor home, or travel trailer on any highway that is part of 21 the interstate system or State primary system or for a publicly owned transit bus, the
22 width limit is 102 inches.
3 (4) For a truck or combination of vehicles, the width limit is 102 inches, 24 provided that:
(i) It is being operated on any part of the interstate system or other

26 State system highways that are designated by the Secretary in conjunction with the
27 U.S. Department of Transportation; or
(ii) It is being operated on a highway that:

1. Is the shortest practical route between a designated

30 highway and a truck terminal, a point of origin/destination for cargo, or for a distance
31 not to exceed 1 mile, facilities for food, fuel, repairs, or rest; or
32
2. Is the safest practical route and is a State highway with 4

33 or more lanes.

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(5) For any other vehicle, the width limit is 96 inches.
(ii) In which the fifth wheel is located on a drop frame behind and 32 below the rear axle of the power unit.

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16 (d) Except as otherwise provided in this section, a bus, a single unit truck, or 17 a Class M motor home may not be over 40 feet long.

18 (e) (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, a publicly owned rigid 19 bus may not be over 41 feet long.
(I) ANY PART OF THE INTERSTATE HIGHWAY SYSTEM OR THE 25 STATE PRIMARY SYSTEM; OR

1 an overall length limitation. This combination may only be operated on any part of
2 the interstate system or other State system highways that are designated by the
3 Secretary in conjunction with the U.S. Department of Transportation, or on a
4 highway that is the shortest practical route between a designated highway and a
5 truck terminal, or point of origin/destination for cargo, or for a distance not to exceed
61 mile, facilities for food, fuel, repairs, or rest. A semitrailer or trailer being operated
7 in this combination may not exceed 28 feet in length for each unit.
8 (i) When a semitrailer (single) is being operated in combination with a truck
9 tractor, the combination of vehicles shall not be subject to an overall length limit,
10 however, the semitrailer may not exceed 48 feet in length.
11 (j) Except as otherwise provided in this section:
12 (1) In a combination of vehicles with a power unit that is a 13 cargo-carrying vehicle, the overall length of the combination may not exceed 62 feet;

14 (2) Any other combination of vehicles may not exceed 55 feet; and
15 (3) (i) 1. A truck or truck tractor and semitrailer combination 16 designed for and engaged exclusively in the transportation of automobiles or boats 17 may not exceed 65 feet in length;
18 2. A stinger-steered automobile transporter or a

19 saddle-mount or a full-mount combination may not exceed 75 feet in length; and
20 3. A. A maxi-cube vehicle described in subsection (a)(4)(i)
21 of this section may not exceed 65 feet in length; and
22 B. A maxi-cube vehicle described in subsection (a)(4)(ii) of
23 this section may not exceed 60 feet in length;
24 (ii) No other length requirements may be applied to the 25 combinations of vehicles described in item (i) of this paragraph; and
(iii) The combinations of vehicles described in item (i) of this

27 paragraph may only be operated on any part of the interstate system or other State
28 system highways that are designated by the Secretary in conjunction with the U.S.
29 Department of Transportation, or on a highway that is the shortest practical route
30 between a designated highway and:

1. A truck terminal;
2. A point of origin/destination for cargo; or
3. For a distance not to exceed 1 mile, facilities for food, fuel,

35 (j-1) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (j) of this section, when a
36 semitrailer is being operated in combination with a power unit that is equipped with

1 a dromedary box being used to transport explosives and munitions classified under 49
2 C.F.R. Part 173.50 that are intended for use by the United States Department of
3 Defense, the combination of vehicles is not subject to an overall length limit, but the
4 semitrailer may not exceed 48 feet in length.
5 (k) (1) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (h) of this section, 6 nothing shall prevent the operation of a combination of vehicles in which the 7 semitrailer (single) does not exceed $481 / 2$ feet in length or a combination of vehicles in 8 which the semitrailer or trailer (double) does not exceed $281 / 2$ feet in length for each 9 unit; provided, the combination has been lawfully operated on the highways of this 10 State prior to December 1, 1982.
11 (2) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (j)(1) of this section, 12 nothing shall prevent a power unit, which was equipped with a dromedary box, deck, 13 or plate and was legally operated in Maryland prior to December 1, 1982, in 14 combination with a semitrailer or trailer from exceeding the overall length limit of 55 15 feet.
16 (1) (1) In this subsection, "vehicle" means:
(i) A semitrailer as defined in § 11-158 of this article; or
(ii) A trailer as defined in § 11-169 of this article.
(2) Notwithstanding the overall length of the combination, a truck 20 tractor may not be operated on a highway in the State in combination with more than
212 vehicles.

22 (m) (1) Subject to paragraph (2) of this subsection, a combination of 23 noncommercial vehicles consisting of a power unit and a travel trailer may not exceed
24 [60] 65 feet in length.
25 (2) The combination of vehicles exceeding 55 feet but authorized under 26 this subsection may only be operated on:
(i) Any part of the interstate system or other State system

28 highways that are designated by the Secretary in conjunction with the U.S.
29 Department of Transportation; or
(ii) A highway that is the shortest practical route between a

31 designated highway and:

1. A point of origin or destination on a particular day; or
2. For a distance not to exceed 1 mile, facilities for food, fuel,
