## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A House Joint Resolution concerning

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## Maryland Victims of the 2001 Anthrax Attacks - Recognizing a Problem

3 FOR the purpose of urging the Congress of the United States to recognize that the

4 Maryland anthrax victims are individuals to whom the government has an

5 obligation to provide care; urging Congress to require health insurance

6 companies to cover the medical bills of Maryland anthrax victims; urging

7 Congress to obtain diagnostic criteria for an anthrax-related disability in the

8 workers' compensation system; providing that a copy of this resolution be

9 forwarded by the Department of Legislative Services to certain individuals; and

10 generally relating to Maryland anthrax victims.

11 WHEREAS, Five people were killed and seven others remain seriously injured 12 after inhaling anthrax spores in September and October of 2001; and

WHEREAS, One of the Maryland victims was showered with anthrax-laden
dust while working at the Brentwood postal center in Washington and although he
has not tested positive for anthrax he has been diagnosed with Aborted Anthrax
Syndrome; and

WHEREAS, At least six 68 people have tested positive for anthrax or receivedprolonged treatment for their exposure; and

19 WHEREAS, Three of the victims of the anthrax attack live in Maryland; and

WHEREAS, All three of the Maryland victims have experienced extreme difficulty in obtaining coverage of the substantial medical bills resulting from the anthrax exposure; and

WHEREAS, The health insurance companies of the Maryland victims initially refused to cover the medical bills resulting from the anthrax exposure because the exposure was allegedly an act of war; and

WHEREAS, Two of the victims finally received coverage of medical bills from their insurance company only after public pressure from medical societies and doctors who exposed the company's refusal of coverage; and

1 WHEREAS, The United States Department of Labor refused to cover the

2 Maryland victims without a full review for each visit, treatment, or procedure without3 approval; and

4 WHEREAS, The source and the cause of the attacks have never been 5 determined; and

6 WHEREAS, The Maryland victims have work-related injuries and have
7 qualified for workers' compensation; however, coverage of medical bills is limited to 1
8 year unless partial or full disability is proven; and

9 WHEREAS, There are no criteria for making a determination of a partial or full 10 disability resulting from exposure to inhalation anthrax because the disease did not 11 previously exist; and

WHEREAS, The Maryland victims were injured in an attack on the United
States and deserve to be recognized by the government as individuals to whom the
government has an obligation to provide care; now, therefore, be it

15 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the 16 General Assembly urges the Congress of the United States to recognize that the 17 Maryland anthrax victims are individuals to whom the government has an obligation 18 to provide care; urges the Congress of the United States to require health insurance 19 companies to cover the medical bills of Maryland anthrax victims; and urges the 20 Congress of the United States to obtain diagnostic criteria for an anthrax-related

21 disability in the workers' compensation system; and be it further
