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#### 6. Purpose of Bill

The bill would authorize a State grant of up to \$350,000 to the Board of Directors of the Maryland Food Bank, Inc. for the renovation and capital equipping of a warehouse building located in Halethorpe. The project will be used by the Maryland Food Bank as a food distribution center from which food will be collected and distributed to providers (soup kitchens, food pantries, emergency shelters and other feeding programs) in the Maryland Food Bank network. The providers in the Maryland Food Bank Network who will be served through the project number in excess of 900 and are located throughout Central Maryland, Western Maryland and the Eastern Shore.

### 7. Matching Fund Requirements

Prior to the effective date of this Act, the grantee shall provide and expend a matching fund. No part of the fund may consist of real property, in kind contributions, or funds expended prior to the effective date of this Act.

#### 9. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization

The Maryland Food Bank, founded in April 1979, distributes food and other supplies for more than 900 community food providers – soup kitchens, food pantries, emergency shelters, and other feeding programs -- reaching more than 45,000 people each week. Of those served, 43% are children, and increasingly they are the children of the working poor. Food supplies are donated by Maryland companies and food industry giants from across the county -- food that is not marketable, but that is perfectly useable. The primary distribution center in Baltimore serves directly 450 programs, and supplies a branch distribution center on the Eastern Shore (Salisbury) and five subsidiaries (Southern Maryland Food Bank, Garrett County Food Resources, Western Maryland Food Bank, Food Resources in Washington County, and Howard County Food Bank, and will add a sixth subsidiary, a new program opening in Harford County. The Maryland Food Bank distributes approximately three-quarters of a million pounds of food a month to this network across Maryland (excluding Prince George's and Montgomery Counties, which are served by the Capital Area Food Bank). Mission: as long as hunger exists in Maryland, the Maryland Food Bank will strive to supply necessary grocery products to charitable food providers so that these organizations can feed every individual and family in need.

# 10. Description and Purpose of Project

Equiping of the renovated 87,000 sq. ft. food distribution center will increase food distribution by 30% within 3 years. (Currently MFB operates from an aging and inadequate 55,000 sq. ft. facility.) We will quadruple the amount of refrigerated/frozen storage and thereby, the food donations we can handle -- supplies of potatoes, carrots, greens, squash, bananas, frozen dinners and other perishable foods. Equipment includes refrigeration equipment, conveyors, forklifts, racking, scrubber, and flat-bed carts -- all essential to the operation of the renovated facility.

The new facility will allow more volunteers to assist in sorting and repacking food donations. When massive food drives bring in truckloads of groceries, volunteers will work in the repack room to get it ready for distribution in days instead of weeks. They will be able to break down twentypound bags of pasta into smaller family size packages. They will inspect any damaged goods and clean them so it's fit for families.

The food programs, coming from across the state, will be served faster and with more food. Space will be available for volunteer trainings, nutrition education, and food handling presentations. Warehouse racking in a professionally designed space will expand our storage of dry goods, increasing our efficiency and allowing us to bring in available federal commodities and to take two or three trailers of a donation that we currently limit to one. We'll be able to start new initiatives like Kids Café that target kids at after-school programs, and Mobile Pantry that targets under-served communities.
