House Bill 795 (Delegate Hammen)

Health and Government Operations

Consent Provisions - Minors - Mental or Emotional Disorder

This bill authorizes a psychologist to give a parent, guardian, or custodian of a minor, or the spouse of the parent, information about the treatment needed by or provided to the minor for a mental or emotional disorder.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: None. The change would not directly affect governmental finances.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: A minor who is 16 or older has the same capacity as an adult to consent to consultation, diagnosis, and treatment of a mental or emotional disorder by a physician, psychologist, or a clinic. This does not include the capacity to refuse consultation, diagnosis, or treatment for a mental or emotional disorder for which a parent, guardian, or custodian of the minor has given consent.

Without consent of or over the express objection of a minor, the attending physician, or, on advice or direction of the attending physician, a member of the medical staff of a hospital or public clinic may, but need not, give a parent, guardian, or custodian of the minor or the spouse of the parent information about treatment needed by or provided to the minor for a mental or emotional disorder.

Background: Approximately one of every five children in the U.S. has a mental disorder, according to the Bazelon Center for Mental Health Law. Between 5% and 9%, or approximately 3.7 million to 6.6 million children and youth, have a serious emotional disturbance.
