"Until there's a cure, there's Easter Seals." For more than 70 years, the Easter Seals Greater Washington Baltimore Region, Inc. has been carrying out its mission of helping individuals with birth-, accident- or age-related disabilities in Maryland, the District of Columbia and northern Virginia to live with equality, dignity and independence. The organization's goal is to maximize the quality of life available to each individual affected, including family members and caregivers. The organization is an independently incorporated 501 c3 nonprofit affiliate of Easter Seals National, the nation's oldest nonprofit organization serving people with disabilities. Unbeknownst to many, Easter Seals is the nation's largest provider of adult day services and has the largest network of service providers for children and adults living with autism.

Easter Seals provides a combination of direct client services and support services to families, reaching a total of more than 10,000 people in our region each year. The organization offers services in three core programs: 1) early intervention, education and childcare for children with disabilities; 2) senior and adult day services; and 3) home/community medical rehabilitation therapies for children and adults. Other services include family support groups, early development inclusive playgroups, community education, information and referral and public health education.

## 11. Description and Purpose of Project (3000 characters maximum)

Easter Seals (ES) has partnered with Mo. Cty. to implement an innovative project that was initially created to address the growing crisis of inadequate senior day care for those with disabilities and whom are considered "at risk" because of income level or health coverage status. In addition, family caregivers - who now number nearly 1 in 4 - need high-quality, reliable day services near their place of employment. Montgomery County's initial support was the contribution of a \$1.2M parcel of land located at 1414 Spring Street, Silver Spring; in exchange, ES agreed to subsidize \$1.2M in care for at-risk seniors over the next two decades.

As the planning for the center began, the ES board determined that this was also an opportunity to look at the landscape of future disability care. The concept of a "shared site" was developed, bringing together ES' highly successful programs for seniors, adults and children with disabilities. The Inter-Generational Center (IGC) will provide direct services to approx. 1500 clients of all ages annually with activities that will create opportunities to contribute at all stages of life. No longer will one generation receive support to the exclusion of the other.

Now under construction, the IGC will be a community hub. It will house senior/adult day services; geriatric and pediatric physical therapy; speech therapy; academic tutoring; after-school/summer enrichment programs; developmental playgroups; a family caregiver resource center; an Assistive Technology Center (in partnership with DORS) and structured intergenerational activities. Workshops, training programs and many other kinds of activities will round out the use of this space. Partnerships between Easter Seals and other well-known entities with complimentary concerns (such as Johns Hopkins and the Montgomery County Department of Education) are being explored and built upon, ensuring that this new facility will be on the cutting-edge of disability and community care.

This new model of care will not only reap the "spiritual" benefits that research has proven exist when generations interact, it will showcase economic efficiency, critical to the ability of successful non-profits such as ES to continue care in what is becoming - financially - an increasingly hostile health-care environment. As a true public/private enterprise, the IGC has received an outpouring of support from individuals, corporations and foundations, as well as from county, state, and federal partnerships. We are nearing the completion of the capital campaign with \$10 million of the \$16 million needed already raised and respectfully seek approval of this bond bill request to help close the gap. The IGC is a protype of disability care for the future and its completion and opening will have a positive ripple effect across the State and throughout the nation.
