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- 17 (a) A person who fails to comply with the relief granted in an interim 18 protective order under § 4–504.1(c)(1), (2), (3), (4)(i), (7), or (8) of this subtitle, a 19 temporary protective order under § 4–505(a)(2)(i), (ii), (iii), (iv), or (v) of this subtitle, 20 or a final protective order under § 4–506(d)(1), (2), (3), (4), (5), or (12) of this subtitle is 21 guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction is subject, for each offense, to:
- 22 (1) for a first offense, a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or imprisonment not 23 exceeding 90 days or both; and

- (b) An officer shall arrest with or without a warrant and take into custody a person who the officer has probable cause to believe [is in violation of] HAS VIOLATED A PROVISION OF an interim, temporary, or final protective order SPECIFIED IN SUBSECTION (A) OF THIS SECTION in effect at the time of the violation.
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 8 October 1, 2009.
