A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

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Procurement - Living Wage - Repeal

3 FOR the purpose of repealing the provisions of law regarding the living wage for State contracts; repealing the requirement that certain employers pay certain hourly 4 5 wages to employees who work on certain State contracts; repealing the requirement that the Commissioner of Labor and Industry adjust and publish 6 7 certain wages; repealing the requirement that the Commissioner adopt certain 8 regulations; repealing the authority of the Commissioner to require certain 9 employers to keep certain records and submit certain reports; repealing the 10 requirement that the Commissioner make certain assessments regarding the appropriateness of certain measures and placements under the living wage 11 requirements; repealing the requirement that certain employers post certain 12 13 information regarding the living wage; repealing certain requirements regarding the filing, investigation, and resolution of violations of the living wage 14 requirements; repealing provisions regarding the filing of actions for the 15 violation of living wage requirements; and generally relating to the repeal of the 16 17 living wage law.

SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect October 1, 2009.
