#### FISCAL AND POLICY NOTE

House Bill 410 Ways and Means (Delegate Hixson, et al.)

#### **Education - Statewide Maintenance of Effort Waiver**

This emergency bill waives the public school maintenance of effort (MOE) requirement for the counties and Baltimore City for fiscal 2011. For fiscal 2012, the minimum required level of appropriation by the county governing body and Baltimore City will be calculated based on the per pupil local appropriation for fiscal 2011 or 2010, whichever is greater.

#### **Fiscal Summary**

**State Effect:** The bill eliminates the possibility of any general fund reduction due to MOE penalties for FY 2011 by waiving the MOE requirement. Revenues are not affected.

**Local Effect:** County governing bodies may choose to reduce their appropriations to local school systems in FY 2011 due to the waiver of the MOE requirement. If county governing bodies choose to reduce their appropriations to local school systems, local school system revenues from State aid will not be reduced in FY 2011.

**Small Business Effect:** None.

# **Analysis**

**Current Law/Background:** To be eligible for increases in State education aid under Section 5-202 of the Education Article (the State share of the foundation program, the State's largest aid to education program; the geographic cost of education index; and the supplemental grant), a local jurisdiction must provide at least as much funding per pupil to the local school system as it provided in the previous fiscal year. Chapter 175 of 1996

added a waiver provision that allows counties to request from the State Board of Education a partial or temporary waiver from the MOE requirement. Until fiscal 2010, the waiver option had never been used, but three counties (Montgomery, Prince George's, and Wicomico) applied for waivers for fiscal 2010. All three applications were denied by the State Board of Education.

During the fiscal crisis of the early 1990s, the General Assembly passed legislation in 1991 and 1992 waiving MOE requirements for fiscal 1992 and 1993.

**Local Fiscal Effect:** County governing bodies may choose to reduce their appropriations to local school systems in fiscal 2011 due to the MOE requirement being waived in fiscal 2011. **Exhibit 1** details the estimated required MOE for fiscal 2011 for each county, which ranges from \$1.5 billion for Montgomery County to \$8.6 million for Somerset County. Under the bill county governing bodies could choose to reduce their appropriations to local school systems by any amount and not lose any State education aid due to MOE penalties. In fiscal 2012, the required MOE level would be based on the local appropriation from either fiscal 2010 or 2011, whichever is greater.
