17 (a) (1) (i) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, an award 18 under this subtitle shall be made in accordance with the schedule of benefits, as it 19 existed on January 1, 2001, and degree of disability as specified in Title 9, Subtitle 6 of 20 the Labor and Employment Article and any other applicable provisions of the Labor 21 and Employment Article, except for Title 9, Subtitle 8 of the Labor and Employment 22 Article.

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1 (ii) if the injury to the victim results in permanent total  $\mathbf{2}$ disability, up to an additional \$25,000 after a disability-related claim has been 3 awarded to the victim; 4 (2)\$45,000 for a medical claim;  $\mathbf{5}$ \$5.000 for each claimant for psychiatric, psychological, or mental (3)6 health counseling under subsection (a)(4) of this section;  $\overline{7}$ (4) except as provided in item (1)(ii) of this subsection, a total of 8 \$45.000, including any subsequent and supplemental awards; 9 \$250 for each claimant for repair, replacement, or cleaning of (5)property damaged, soiled, or littered as a result of a crime or law enforcement 10 investigation of a crime; or 11 12for an award for psychiatric, psychological, or mental health (6)13counseling made under subsection (a)(6) of this section: 14\$1,000 for each claimant; and (i) \$5,000 for each incident. 15(ii) 16An award made under this subtitle shall be reduced by the amount of any (c) 17payments received or to be received as a result of the injury: from or on behalf of the offender: 18(1)19except as provided in item (3) of this subsection, from any other (2)20public or private source, including an award of the State Workers' Compensation 21Commission under the Maryland Workers' Compensation Act; 22from any proceeds of life insurance in excess of \$25,000; or (3)23(4) as an emergency award under § 11–813 of this subtitle. 24If there are two or more persons entitled to an award as a result of the (d) 25death of a victim, the award shall be apportioned among the claimants. 26The Board may negotiate a settlement with a health care provider for the (e) 27medical and medically related expenses. 28SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 29October 1, 2011.
