10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)

Easter Seals is a nonprofit, community-based health organization dedicated to increasing the independence of children and adults with disabilities or special needs through direct services and advocacy. Easter Seals provides exceptional services to ensure that all people with disabilities or special needs and their families have equal opportunities to live, learn, work, and play in their communities. Since its founding in 1948, Easter Seals Delaware and Maryland's Eastern Shore has served thousands of children and adults with disabilities through direct services in rehabilitation, vocational training and placement, recreation, and advocacy in Delaware and on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. In 2010, Easter Seals served approximately 24,000 individuals from sites throughout Delaware and Maryland's Eastern Shore. Easter Seals provides services in 3 locations in Maryland: outpatient pediatric therapies in Salisbury and Pocomoke City, and recreation and respite at Camp Fairlee Manor in Chestertown. Easter Seals is the only provider of outpatient pediatric therapies on the Eastern Shore and is one of few camps in the Mid-Atlantic region that is fully accessible for people with disabilities.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

Easter Seals has provided vital Recreation and Respite services at Camp Fairlee Manor since 1954. Camp Fairlee Manor, a 250-acre site near Chestertown, is the only camp in our region that provides year-round typical residential camp experiences for children and adults with disabilities. Campers enjoy a fun, supportive camp environment while family members enjoy time off from continuous caregiving. Participants have opportunities to expand their horizons by experiencing typical camp activities like swimming, fishing, horseback riding or campfire sing-a-longs. Camp Fairlee offers week-long sessions throughout the summer and weekend respites October through May. In 2010, nearly 750 individuals ages 7 to 87 enjoyed programs at Camp Fairlee Manor, and approximately 75 percent of these campers were Maryland residents. Planned capital improvements include construction of two new cabins, adding capacity for 24 additional campers each session.

28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)
(#13) Fundraising Sources: Easter Seals Building Maintenance Fund typically generates \$150,000 annually, and is used toward capital expenses throughout the organization. The Building Maintenance Fund is part of privately donated endowment funds. Although the fund's purpose is to support any property owned by Easter Seals, the organization recently completely a \$15 million capital campaign funding new buildings in Georgetown and New Castle. As new construction, these facilities should have minimal needs from the Building Maintenance Fund. In addition, Easter Seals annually raises approximately \$200,000 to support Camp operations, and over \$500,000 in unrestricted fundraising to support the organization as the Board and Management determine.
(#15) Total Private Funds and Pledges: Easter Seals annually raises over \$500,000 in unrestricted fundraising that can be allocated to camp capital needs as determined necessary by the Board and Management. However, Easter Seals plans to expand fundraising efforts to include capital requests in addition to operational requests, in order to meet match requirements. Easter Seals demonstrated success in raising private matching dollars for the 2008 Bond Bill. Matching contributions included \$5,500 from corporations, \$10,000 foundation support, \$12,000 from a local United Way, and \$47,500 in contributions from individuals designated for the capital funds match.
