3 FOR the purpose of revising, updating, reorganizing, and clarifying Title 1 of the 4 Maryland Uniform Commercial Code (MUCC) relating to general provisions $\mathbf{5}$ applicable to the MUCC; establishing a certain short title; clarifying the 6 transactions to which Title 1 of the MUCC applies; providing for the effect of 7 Title 1 of the MUCC on a certain federal law; authorizing the subordination of 8 an obligation or a right to performance under certain circumstances; providing 9 that subordination does not create a certain security interest; making certain stylistic changes; defining certain terms; altering and repealing certain 10 definitions; making conforming changes to certain provisions of the MUCC; and 11 12generally relating to the Maryland Uniform Commercial Code.
