FISCAL AND POLICY NOTE

House Bill 105 Ways and Means (Delegate McConkey)

Anne Arundel County Board of Education - Selection of Members - Straw Ballot

This bill requires the Anne Arundel County Board of Elections to hold a nonbinding referendum at the November 2012 general election regarding the selection of members to the Anne Arundel County Board of Education. The proposed referendum asks whether voters favor changing the selection method of school board members from appointment by the Governor to a direct election by county voters.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2012.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: None.

Local Effect: The Anne Arundel County Board of Elections can handle the bill's requirements with existing resources.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: The Anne Arundel County Board of Education consists of nine members, of whom three members are appointed from the county at large, five members are appointed from each of the five legislative districts in the county, and one is a student member. Except for the student member, the Governor must appoint a member of the county board from a list of nominees submitted by the School Board Nominating Commission of Anne Arundel County.

The School Board Nominating Commission of Anne Arundel County was established in 2007 (Chapter 454). The commission must submit at least two nominees to the Governor

for each vacancy for the county board, unless there are fewer than two applicants for a vacancy.

Chapters 177 and 178 of 2011 specify that a member of the Anne Arundel County Board of Education must be appointed by the Governor from a list of nominees submitted by the School Board Nominating Commission, subject to election by the registered voters of the county at the general election following the member's nomination and appointment, regardless of whether that member is serving a first or second term.

Background: The Anne Arundel County Board of Education is one of five appointed school boards in the State, including one (Caroline County) that is in the process of transitioning to a hybrid board of appointed and elected members. Harford County has such a hybrid board. Eighteen local boards are elected by county voters. The selection method and number of school board members for each of the 24 local boards are shown in **Exhibit 1**.
