ON OR BEFORE DECEMBER 31 OF EACH YEAR, THE <del>(II)</del> (B) INTERAGENCY COMMITTEE SHALL SUBMIT A REPORT ON THE NUMBER OF PUBLIC SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION AND MAJOR RENOVATION PROJECTS IN EACH JURISDICTION THAT USE SOLAR TECHNOLOGIES TO THE GOVERNOR AND, IN ACCORDANCE WITH § 2-1246 OF THE STATE GOVERNMENT ARTICLE, THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY. SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June 1, 2013.

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
