1(D)(1)EACH COUNTY BOARD'S SYSTEM OF INTERVENTION FOR2CHRONICALLY ABSENT STUDENTS SHALL REQUIRE INTERACTION BETWEEN3SCHOOL SYSTEM PERSONNEL, THE STUDENT, AND THE STUDENT'S PARENTS OR4GUARDIAN TO EMPHASIZE THE IMPORTANCE OF REGULAR ATTENDANCE AND5STRATEGIES FOR ENSURING REGULAR ATTENDANCE.

6 (2) THIS INTERACTION MAY INCLUDE COUNSELING OR PARENT 7 EDUCATION CLASSES.

8 (E) (C) (1) ANY EACH CHRONICALLY ABSENT TRUANT STUDENT 9 ATTENDING KINDERGARTEN THROUGH 12TH GRADE WHO IS UNLAWFULLY 10 ABSENT MORE THAN 10% OF THE SCHOOL DAYS IN ANY GIVEN QUARTER, 11 SEMESTER, OR ACADEMIC YEAR SHALL IMMEDIATELY BE REFERRED TO THE 12 COUNTY BOARD'S SYSTEM OF ACTIVE INTERVENTION FOR STUDENTS WHO ARE 13 CHRONICALLY ABSENT FROM SCHOOL DEVELOPED UNDER THIS SECTION.

14(2)THE COUNTY BOARD MAY INTERVENE AT A LOWER LEVEL OF15ABSENCES.

16 (2) THIS SECTION DOES NOT PROHIBIT A COUNTY BOARD FROM
17 INTERVENING IN THE CASE OF A STUDENT WHO IS FREQUENTLY ABSENT FROM
18 SCHOOL BUT WHO IS NOT A CHRONICALLY ABSENT STUDENT FOR BOTH LAWFUL
19 AND UNLAWFUL PURPOSES, BUT IS NOT A TRUANT STUDENT.

20 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 21 October 1, 2013.
