4 FOR the purpose of repealing the death penalty; repealing procedures and 5 requirements related to the death penalty; providing that in certain cases in 6 which the State has filed a notice to seek a sentence of death, the notice shall be 7 considered withdrawn and it shall be considered a notice to seek a sentence of 8 life imprisonment without the possibility of parole under certain circumstances; 9 providing that certain persons serving life sentences are not eligible for Patuxent Institution under certain circumstances; altering the circumstance 10 concerning parole for persons serving life sentences when the State sought a 11 12 certain penalty; requiring the Governor to include in the annual budget 13 submission for certain fiscal years a certain amount for the State Victims of Crime Fund; making conforming and clarifying changes; and generally relating 14 15 to the repeal of the death penalty.

11 12 13	WHEREAS, The Commission comprised 23 appointees representing a broad diversity of views on capital punishment, as well as the racial, ethnic, gender, and geographic diversity of the State; and
14 15 16 17	WHEREAS, The Commission held five public hearings at which testimony from experts and members of the public was presented and discussed, as well as five additional meetings to discuss the evidence presented at the hearings and in the written submissions; and

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
