CHAPTER _____

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Courts and Judicial Proceedings – Interception of Communications – Abuse**
3 **or Neglect of Vulnerable Adult and Medicaid Fraud**

4 FOR the purpose of adding abuse or neglect of a vulnerable adult and offenses relating
5 to Medicaid fraud to those crimes for which certain evidence may be gathered
6 by, and a judge may grant an order authorizing, interception of oral, wire, or
7 electronic communications; and generally relating to interception of
8 communications.

14 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
15 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

16 **Article – Courts and Judicial Proceedings**

26 M. A fraudulent insurance act, as defined in Title 27,

28 N. An offense relating to destructive devices under §
29 4–503 of the Criminal Law Article;

1 O. A human trafficking offense under § 11–303 of the
2 Criminal Law Article;

3 P. Sexual solicitation of a minor under § 3–324 of the

5 Q. An offense relating to obstructing justice under §
6 9–302, § 9–303, or § 9–305 of the Criminal Law Article;

23 (a) The Attorney General, State Prosecutor, or any State’s Attorney may
24 apply to a judge of competent jurisdiction, and the judge, in accordance with the
25 provisions of § 10–408 of this subtitle, may grant an order authorizing the interception
26 of wire, oral, or electronic communications by investigative or law enforcement officers
27 when the interception may provide or has provided evidence of the commission of:

28 (1) Murder;

29 (2) Kidnapping;

30 (3) Rape;

- 1 (4) A sexual offense in the first or second degree;
- 2 (5) Child abuse in the first or second degree;

11 of § 5–617 or § 5–619 of the Criminal Law Article;

15 Criminal Law Article;

3 **[(20)] (22)** A conspiracy or solicitation to commit an offense listed in
4 items (1) through **[(19)] (21)** of this subsection.

5 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
6 October 1, 2013.
