3 FOR the purpose of requiring a court to issue a permanent final protective order 4 against an individual who is sentenced to, instead of who served, a certain term $\mathbf{5}$ of imprisonment for certain crimes a certain act of abuse under certain 6 circumstances and who has served a certain period of time; adding the crime of 7 assault in the second degree to the list of altering the crimes, the commission of which subjects an individual to the issuance of a permanent final protective 8 9 order against the individual under certain circumstances; and generally relating 10 to domestic violence and permanent final protective orders.

- 21 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 22 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

1 (2) In a final protective order issued under this subsection, the court 2 may grant only the relief that was granted in the original protective order under 3 subsection (d)(1) or (2) of this section.

4 (3) Unless terminated at the request of the victim, a final protective 5 order issued under this subsection shall be permanent.

6 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 7 October 1, 2013.
