program. In 1988, KCSC received approximately \$4 million from HUD and built the 65 unit apartment in Silver Spring, MD. Also, in 2010, KCSC received additional \$4,143,300 from HUD for 27 unit extension to the existing apartment. Currently, a community fund-raising campaign is going on to ensure additional community-based matching funds.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

Korean Community Service Center of Greater Washington (KCSC) is requesting \$450,000 for a renovation project at the University Gardens Senior Apartments, located on University Boulevard in Silver Spring, Maryland. University Gardens primarily serve low- and moderate income Asian immigrants over the age of 65 as well as a smaller number of Asians with disabilities. The proposed project is shovel-ready and the funds will be used to renovate a 1,700 square foot space in the basement of the University Gardens Senior Apartments in order to create a new 500 square foot kitchen with a dining area and 1,200 square foot gymnasium/multi-purpose room. KCSC has had significant experience in building government-subsidized apartments through the HUD 202 program. In 1988, KCSC received \$4 million in HUD 202 funding, which was used to build the 65-unit University Gardens Senior Apartments. In 2010, KCSC was granted a second \$4,143,300 HUD 202 grant to add another 27 much needed apartments to the existing building. In September 13, 2012, there was a ground breaking ceremony and it is expected that the new units will be completed by August 2013. KCSC will be able to use this \$4,143,300 HUD 202 grant as a federal funding match to this Bond Bill Request.

28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)

University Gardens Senior Apartments provides safe and affordable accommodation to elderly and disabled Asian immigrants, however, the residents are in great need for a new communal space for physical fitness and recreational activities, educational programs and opportunities for sharing food with each other. According to the 2010 Census, 135,451 Asian Americans live in Montgomery County and 10.6% of the population or 14,296 are 65 years of age and older, of which 6,594 are men and 7,702 are women. The poverty rate is at 11.4 %. There are more than three times as many women as men live alone. Interestingly, while the overall Asian population increased by nearly 37,000 since the 2000 Census, the 65 + Asian population has literally doubled. In 2000, there were only 7,171 Asians that were 65+. Asian seniors face many health and mental health issues, including: depression, dementia types of diseases, anxiety disorder, diabetes, hypertension, osteoporosis, and others. Because of their economic and social vulnerability, lack of language skills, and lack of knowledge of health care options, these immigrants face challenges in sustaining or attaining good health care options and networks. KCSC is proposing to build a new gymnasium and institute a fitness program that promotes healthy and active living practices, which will help to prevent illness and reduce feelings of isolation. The gym will also serve double duty as a multipurpose room for important socialization activities such as dance classes, health workshops, English classes, and even bingo or movie nights. The gymnasium will be used for many different kinds of exercise programs designed to promote the senior residents' healthy mind and body. It will also have an area devoted to cardiovascular exercise and resistance training for seniors. The gymnasium will also be able to be easily converted into a multipurpose recreation room, which will be able to accommodate up to 200 people with theatre style seating and can be used for classroom or meeting space. KCSC is also proposing to install a built-in amp and surround-sound speakers, a retractable projection screen and a mini pipe organ in the gymnasium. The projection screen will be used for educational classes and movie nights. The sound system will be used for aerobics, fitness, and dance classes and will also allow residents to enjoy musical evenings, dancing and sing-alongs. Such activities are vitally important to the senior Asian community. The gymnasium/multipurpose room will be adjacent to the new fully-equipped commercial grade kitchen and dining area, which can be used everyday and also for holidays and special events. The kitchen area will be fully equipped to enable the large-scale preparation of culturally appropriate food for special events. In addition to standard professional kitchen equipment, we intend to include essentials for the Asian kitchen such as a built-in wok station and commercial rice cookers.
