Health and Government Operations

State Government - Commemorative Days - Earth Hour

This emergency bill requires, except under specified circumstances, the Governor to annually issue an order, in observance of Earth Hour, that requires the lights in the Government House and the State House to be turned off on the last Saturday in March at 8:30 p.m. and to remain off for one hour. The Governor is not required to issue an order if emergency circumstances exist that make issuing the order ill-advised. The order issued may not require the lights of the State House to be turned off if either House of the General Assembly has convened a session in the chamber of the House.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: Commemorating Earth Hour does not affect State finances. Any decrease in expenditures from shutting the lights down in the Government House and the State House are negligible.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: Nine official commemorative days and three months are recognized in State law as shown in **Exhibit 1**. The Governor also must issue a proclamation each year encouraging citizens and other individuals to observe a moment of silence at 3 p.m. on Memorial Day to unite in remembrance and commemorate the heroic acts and efforts of Marylanders who have served and died in the U.S. Armed Forces.

Background: Earth Hour is the World Wildlife Fund's global initiative in which individuals, schools, organizations, businesses, and governments turn off their lights for one hour to cast a vote in favor of action on climate change. By voting with their light switches, Earth Hour participants send a visual message demanding action be taken to combat climate change.

In 2012, more than 7,000 cities in 152 countries participated in Earth Hour. In the United States, an estimated 90 million Americans participated in Earth Hour 2010. Iconic landmarks around the world participated in Earth Hour 2010 including the Las Vegas Strip, Mount Rushmore, and the Empire State Building. The next Earth Hour is scheduled for March 23, 2013; however, the last Saturday of March in 2013 will be March 30, 2013.
