The Baltimore Curriculum Project (BCP) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that operates

The Baltimore Curriculum Project (BCP) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that operates four neighborhood charter schools serving over 2,000 PreK-8 children in East Baltimore: City Springs Elementary/Middle School, Collington Square School of the Arts, Hampstead Hill Academy and Wolfe Street Academy. Sixty-six percent (1,351) of our students are African-American and 18% (375) are Latino. Over 91% of our students qualify for the Federal Free/Reduced Meals Program.

BCP's mission/purpose is to To develop, implement, and advocate for an innovative, sustainable, and replicable education model that improves student outcomes. In so doing, the Baltimore Curriculum Project will help to raise educational standards and opportunities for disadvantaged youth and Baltimore City schools. City Springs Elementary/Middle School serves over 600 African-American students in grades PreK through eight. Ninety-five percent of the students qualify for free and reduced meals.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

The City Springs Community Athletic Complex will include a multi-purpose artificial turf field for football, baseball, soccer, and lacrosse; running/walking track; playground; concession building; fence with card access; security camera system; ample seating; and an ornamental fence.

Baltimore City Public Schools has committed approximately \$715,000 towards this project. The complex is part of a larger Scholar-Athlete School vision that will capitalize on the strength of the coach/athlete mentoring relationship in order to change student attitudes about healthy living, school attendance, and academic success.

City Springs students and students from neighboring schools need a safe place to exercise and play sports in order to improve health, school attendance and academic achievement. Increased physical activity will help reduce the growing epidemic of childhood obesity and associated health problems. The athletic complex is critical to supporting the growing day school and after-school athletic opportunities, especially those geared towards elementary grades students. The facility will provided the desperately needed space for additional, positive in-school and after-school activities that will support health, school attendance, and academic.

28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)

This capital project has a useful life of over 15 years. The athletic complex will not be used for religious purposes and the area to by renovated does not contain any structures.

The Baltimore Curriculum Project has secured funding from Baltimore City Public Schools, Legg Mason, and individual donors. We have requested funding from local foundations and corporations. Membership fees and concession profits may be used to pay for some of the costs of the capital project. The Baltimore Curriculum Project has secured \$722,838 in matching funds for this project.

The project is ready to move forward "shovel ready" and has sufficient other source funds immediately available. The site has been cleared of trees, fencing, benches, and playground equipment. A playground has been moved and the school parking lot has been reconfigured and repaved to create space for the capital project.

The project will benefit children and families living in Baltimore City and Baltimore County in a number of ways:

- 1. INCREASED OPPORTUNITIES FOR THOUSANDS OF CHILDREN AND FAMILIES: The complex will provide thousands of elementary and middle school children with the opportunity to play on a turf field and track and prepare them to compete in high school and college. Families will also be able to utilize the complex using a key card access system.
- 2. ACCESS FOR TRADITIONAL, CHARTER AND INDEPENDENT SCHOOLS: City Springs Elementary/Middle School, The Crossroads School, Collington Square School of the Arts, Gilman School, Hampstead Hill Academy, Patterson Park Public Charter School, Wolfe Street Academy and others will utilize the athletic complex.
- 3. EXPANDED PROGRAMMING: The project will support existing and new programs/leagues including the Patterson Park Elementary Soccer League, City Springs Tackle Football Program, Councilman Kraft Baseball League, BCP Lacrosse League, the BCP Elementary Flag Football League, and the City Springs Track and Field program. Field lighting will allow for evening activities.
- 4. A MODEL FOR MARYLAND: City Springs will become a model Scholar Athlete school and share best practices with schools throughout Maryland.
- 5. SPORTS FOR ELEMENTARY GRADES: The athletic complex will enable City Springs to offer elementary football, baseball, lacrosse and track, so that students do not have to wait until middle school to be involved in organized sports. Currently, middle and high school programs utilize all available field time in the neighborhood.

ANTICIPATED RESULTS

We anticipate the following results from the project:

- 1. Improved student health and wellness;
- 2. Reduced chronic absenteeism; and
- 3. Improved academic achievement.
