FISCAL AND POLICY NOTE

House Bill 167 (Delegate Ivey, *et al.*)  
Health and Government Operations Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs

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State Government - Commemorative Days - Maryland Emancipation Day

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This bill requires the Governor to annually proclaim November 1 as Maryland Emancipation Day in recognition of the emancipation of the slaves in the State.

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Fiscal Summary

**State Effect:** Commemorating Maryland Emancipation Day does not affect State finances.

**Local Effect:** None.

**Small Business Effect:** None.

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Analysis

**Current Law:** Nine official commemorative days and three months are recognized in State law as shown in **Exhibit 1**. The Governor also must issue a proclamation each year encouraging citizens and other individuals to observe a moment of silence at 3 p.m. on Memorial Day to unite in remembrance and commemorate the heroic acts and efforts of Marylanders who have served and died in the U.S. Armed Forces.

**Background:** On November 1, 1864, Maryland adopted a new constitution that abolished slavery, making it the first state with slaves to voluntarily free its slaves by popular vote. Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation of 1863 had only freed slaves in rebel states, of which Maryland was not one.

Since 1867, the small town of Trappe, located in Talbot County, has hosted an Emancipation Day celebration known as “Uncle Nace’s Day” in honor of Nathaniel Hopkins (~1831-1900), who founded the celebration. Nathaniel Hopkins – known to his friends and family as “Uncle Nace” – was born into slavery, served in the Union Army during the Civil War, and was a community leader. For the first 30 years, Hopkins himself led the parade, dressed in his full Union Army uniform. After his death, the citizens of Trappe decided to continue the tradition of the Emancipation Day festivities, although they are now held on the second Saturday in October.

In 2012, Montgomery County Parks hosted a weekend of events to celebrate Emancipation Day, including a night hike on the Underground Railroad Experience Trail.
