10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)

St. Anns was founded in 1860 by three Daughters of Charity to serve orphaned and abandoned children and single women in childbirth. For over 152 years, St. Anns has continued to pioneer innovative programs that reclaim the lives of our regions most vulnerable young women and children. Three of our critical programs support women and families from Prince Georges and Montgomery Counties, Maryland: Teen Mother-Baby (support for pregnant and parenting teens), Faith House (Transitional Housing for young women with children), and the Community Child Care Center (affordable child care for young families). St. Anns operates from its facility in Hyattsville, Maryland, along the northeastern city limits of Washington, D.C. An ad hoc committee of board members and staff analyzed our current programs to streamline our services as well as identify new programs for children and young women at risk. In the coming year, our childrens residential program, which was underutilized, will be suspended. In its place, we are adding new transitional housing beds for women and children who are victims of domestic violence as well as homeless women with children.

## 11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

St. Anns has made a concerted effort to update our physical plant - we have replaced our roof and our heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems and have renovated space to provide a more home-like atmosphere for our residents. But more in needed. Our building was opened in 1962 and much of the original fixtures remain. In order to make our facility safer, we propose to install new front doors, improve ADA accessibility, and install a new security system that would include a video intercom entry system, access control system and video surveillance system upgrade. These renovations, as well as minor updating of one housing wing, will help us better serve all our families and increase the number of homeless women we serve by opening 8 new transitional housing beds. The childrens program, which served unaccompanied minors, required a higher ration of staffing. The transitional housing units will require less staffing as the family will remain intact. Our mission to serve vulnerable populations remains the same. The square footage of the building will not be impacted.

## 28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)

For over 152 years, St. Ann's mission has not waivered - to shelter and serve vulnerable children and families. Today more than ever, destitute young mothers in our community need help.

Affordable housing in the greater Washington area has long been a problem for low-income families - even for two-parent families in which both parents are employed. The problem is even more extreme for young, single mothers with little or no work experience. Over the course of a year, we tracked the number of calls from young women in need of shelter and housing. We received over 350 calls during our business hours. This did not include the calls on nights and weekends or calls that were referrals from community agencies. These calls underline the need for safe and secure housing for women.

These statistics tell the story of persistent need. At St. Ann's, the statistics aren't just numbers - they are infants, children, pregnant and parenting teens, and young single mothers with names and faces and overwhelming needs. We work hard every day to meet these needs with effective, comprehensive programs that improve the health, education and economic outcomes of at-risk young mothers and children. A wide range of skilled professionals and dedicated volunteers work tirelessly with our residents to ensure no need falls through the cracks. Women and children come to St. Ann's in crisis. They leave with the hope and confidence that only a solid foundation of care can provide.
