Tax Increases – Super Majority Vote Required

- FOR the purpose of proposing an amendment to the Maryland Constitution to require
 the approval of two-thirds of the members elected to each House of the General
 Assembly to pass legislation to increase the rate of an existing tax or to impose
 a tax on an individual or entity not subject to the tax at the time of
 consideration of the legislation; and submitting this amendment to the qualified
 voters of the State for their adoption or rejection.

12 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 13 MARYLAND, (Three-fifths of all the members elected to each of the two Houses 14 concurring), That it be proposed that the Maryland Constitution read as follows:

Article III – Legislative Department

16 **28A.**

A BILL TO INCREASE THE RATE OF AN EXISTING TAX OR TO IMPOSE A TAX AGAINST AN INDIVIDUAL OR ENTITY NOT SUBJECT TO THE TAX AT THE TIME OF CONSIDERATION OF THE BILL MAY NOT BECOME A LAW UNLESS, ON ITS FINAL PASSAGE, THE BILL RECEIVES THE YEA VOTES OF AT LEAST TWO-THIRDS OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.



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1 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the General Assembly 2 determines that the amendment to the Maryland Constitution proposed by this Act 3 affects multiple jurisdictions and that the provisions of Article XIV, § 1 of the 4 Maryland Constitution concerning local approval of constitutional amendments do not 5 apply.

6 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the aforegoing section 7proposed as an amendment to the Maryland Constitution shall be submitted to the 8 qualified voters of the State at the next general election to be held in November 2014 9 for their adoption or rejection pursuant to Article XIV of the Maryland Constitution. At that general election, the vote on this proposed amendment to the Constitution 10 11 shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot there shall be printed the words "For the Constitutional Amendment" and "Against the Constitutional Amendment," as now 12provided by law. Immediately after the election, all returns shall be made to the 13Governor of the vote for and against the proposed amendment, as directed by Article 14XIV of the Maryland Constitution, and further proceedings had in accordance with 1516Article XIV.
