1 AN ACT concerning

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## Task Force on Family Caregiving and Long-Term Supports

FOR the purpose of establishing the Task Force on Family Caregiving and Long-Term Supports; providing for the composition of the Task Force; prohibiting a member of the Task Force from receiving certain compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain expenses; requiring the Task Force to make recommendations for legislative and administrative action relating to family caregiving; requiring the Task Force to report certain recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly on or before a certain date; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to the Task Force on Family Caregiving and Long-Term Supports.

- WHEREAS, 770,000 Marylanders are taking care of loved ones who are aging, have failing health, or are children; and
- WHEREAS, Almost all older adults who need assistance with activities of daily living want to remain in their homes and communities; and

## (d) The Task Force shall:

- (1) identify policies, resources, and programs available for family caregivers and find additional innovative and creative means to support family caregivers to continue to provide needed in–home supports for older adults;
- (2) receive testimony on the needs of family caregivers, including designation of caregivers, training, respite services, medical leave policies, delegation of tasks to nonmedical aides, and other related policies; and
- 10 (3) compile an inventory of the resources available to family 11 caregivers.
- 12 (e) On or before January 31, 2015, the Task Force shall report its recommendations for legislative and administrative action to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly.
  - SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 2014. It shall remain effective for a period of 1 year and, at the end of June 30, 2015, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
