Health Occupations - Ophthalmologists Who Store and Administer Drugs Exclusion From Maryland Pharmacy Act Compound Drugs - Provision to Ophthalmologists for Office Use

5 FOR the purpose of providing that the Maryland Pharmacy Act does not limit the 6 right of ophthalmologists to store in a certain office and administer to a certain 7 patient, without a prescription, certain drugs for the emergency treatment of 8 certain eye conditions; and generally relating to the exclusion of 9 ophthalmologists from the Maryland Pharmacy Act authorizing a pharmacy for 10 which a pharmacy permit has been issued by the State Board of Pharmacy and 11 a sterile compounding facility to provide to an ophthalmologist for office use,
