### A BILL ENTITLED

#### 1 AN ACT concerning

# Calvert County and St. Mary's County – Task Force to Study the Use and Trade of Illicit Opioids in Traditionally Rural Counties

4 FOR the purpose of establishing the Task Force to Study the Use and Trade of Illicit  $\mathbf{5}$ Opioids in Traditionally Rural Counties; providing for the composition, cochairs, 6 and staffing of the Task Force; prohibiting a Task Force member from receiving 7 certain compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain expenses; 8 requiring the Task Force to conduct a certain assessment and make 9 recommendations regarding certain matters; requiring the Task Force to hold certain public meetings and briefings; requiring the Task Force to submit an 10 interim progress report to the Board of County Commissioners of Calvert 11 12County, the Board of County Commissioners of St. Mary's County, and the 13 Calvert County Delegation and the St. Mary's County Delegation to the General Assembly, in a certain manner and on or before a certain date; requiring the 14Task Force to submit a final report of its findings and recommendations to the 1516 Board of County Commissioners of Calvert County, the Board of County 17Commissioners of St. Mary's County, and the Calvert County Delegation and the St. Mary's County Delegation to the General Assembly on or before a certain 18 19 date; making this Act an emergency measure; providing for the termination of 20this Act; and generally relating to the Task Force to Study the Use and Trade of Illicit Opioids in Traditionally Rural Counties. 21

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#### Preamble

WHEREAS, There are numerous indicators, both anecdotal and statistical, of a rapid spike in the illicit delivery and use of opioids, including medically prescribed pain medications and heroin across rural areas of the State; and

WHEREAS, Prescription opioid pain medications such as Oxycontin and Vicodin can have effects similar to heroin when taken in doses or in ways other than prescribed, and they are currently among the most commonly abused drugs in the

1 United States, with research now suggesting that abuse of these drugs may open the 2 door to heroin abuse; and

3 WHEREAS, Rural areas of the State have not historically experienced the 4 troubling and widespread occurrence rate of opioid misuse that has been a 5 longstanding and well documented problem in our nation's urban centers; and

6 WHEREAS, The failure to adequately quantify the extent of this developing 7 problem and suggest related comprehensive interdiction, mitigation, and treatment 8 solutions tailored to be effective in these rural communities will continue to present a 9 clear and present danger to public health and safety; and

10 WHEREAS, The lack of well developed and comprehensive strategies to 11 diminish this opioid abuse in rural areas will continue to challenge the work 12 productivity and commerce in these communities and could have adverse 13 consequences for a broad range of quality-of-life issues; and

WHEREAS, Public resources are limited for addiction treatment, emergency
 medical services, long-term health care, direct and indirect law enforcement issues,
 court-related adjudication, and community education and recognition of abuse; and

WHEREAS, The unique nature of developing new solutions for this emergent
problem in nontraditional areas of abuse, such as rural counties, could serve as a trial
demonstration for developing strategies for use in other rural areas of the State; and

WHEREAS, Calvert County and St. Mary's County have the same form of local government and share many institutions of commerce, government, and education, including a broadly shared legislative district, which is conducive for a bicounty task force to maximize economy and efficiency in the development of solutions applicable across local rural counties; and

WHEREAS, It may be possible for State and county government agencies and other interested parties with specific expertise in these local jurisdictions to find creative ways to help solve this emergent problem; now, therefore,

28 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 29 MARYLAND, That:

30 (a) There is a Task Force to Study the Use and Trade of Illicit Opioids in
 31 Calvert County and St. Mary's County.

32 (b) The Task Force consists of the following members:

33 (1) one member of the Senate of Maryland who represents both

4 (iv) early intervention strategies, efforts in the public school 5 system, and awareness education strategies for the general public, building on and 6 enhancing existing efforts and considering the use of both governmental and 7 community resources and groups, including information offices of State and local 8 government to coordinate public information messages;

- 9 (v) the impact of the problem on local commerce, businesses, 10 and employment; and
- (vi) follow-up monitoring of the effectiveness of the initiatives
  taken as a result of the Task Force recommendations.
- 13 (g) (1) The Task Force shall hold public meetings and briefings in the 14 affected counties as it considers necessary to fully complete its work.
- 15 (2) The Task Force may request subject matter experts, interested 16 parties, and residents of the affected counties to testify as necessary.
- (h) (1) On or before September 30, 2014, the Task Force shall submit an
  interim progress report to the Board of County Commissioners of Calvert County, the
  Board of County Commissioners of St. Mary's County, and, in accordance with §
  20 2–1246 of the State Government Article, to the Calvert County Delegation and the St.
  21 Mary's County Delegation to the General Assembly.
- (2) The interim report of the Task Force shall be in writing or
  presented at a publicly advertised and open meeting of the Task Force, at the
  discretion of the cochairs of the Task Force.
- (i) On or before December 1, 2014, the Task Force shall submit a final report
  of its findings and recommendations to the Board of County Commissioners of Calvert
  County, the Board of County Commissioners of St. Mary's County, and, in accordance
  with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, to the Calvert County Delegation and
  the St. Mary's County Delegation to the General Assembly.
- 30 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act is an emergency 31 measure, is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health or safety, 32 has been passed by a yea and nay vote supported by three-fifths of all the members 33 elected to each of the two Houses of the General Assembly, and shall take effect from 34 the date it is enacted. It shall remain effective through June 30, 2015, and, at the end 35 of June 30, 2015, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act 36 shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
