A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Peace Orders and Protective Orders – Penalties – Second or Subsequent**
3 **Offenses**

4 FOR the purpose of making certain violations for failing to comply with an interim, a
5 temporary, or a final protective order a prior offense for the purposes of
6 determining penalties for a second or subsequent offense for failing to comply
7 with an interim, a temporary, or a final peace order; making certain violations
8 for failing to comply with an interim, a temporary, or a final peace order a prior
9 offense for the purposes of determining penalties for a second or subsequent
10 offense for failing to comply with an interim, a temporary, or a final protective
11 order; and generally relating to the penalties for second or subsequent offenses
12 for violating peace orders and protective orders.

23 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
24 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

25 **Article – Courts and Judicial Proceedings**

26 3–1508.

1 (a) An individual who fails to comply with the relief granted in an interim
 2 peace order under § 3–1503.1 of this subtitle, a temporary peace order under §
 3 3–1504(a)(2) of this subtitle, or a final peace order under § 3–1505(d)(1)(i), (ii), (iii), or
 4 (iv) of this subtitle is guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction is subject to:

5 (1) For a first offense, a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or imprisonment not
 6 exceeding 90 days or both; and

7 (2) For a second or subsequent offense, a fine not exceeding \$2,500 or
 8 imprisonment not exceeding 1 year or both.

9 **(B) FOR THE PURPOSE OF SECOND OR SUBSEQUENT OFFENDER**
 10 **PENALTIES PROVIDED UNDER SUBSECTION (A)(2) OF THIS SECTION, A PRIOR**
 11 **CONVICTION UNDER § 4–509 OF THE FAMILY LAW ARTICLE SHALL BE**
 12 **CONSIDERED A CONVICTION UNDER THIS SECTION.**

13 **[(b)] (C)** A law enforcement officer shall arrest with or without a warrant
 14 and take into custody an individual who the officer has probable cause to believe is in
 15 violation of an interim peace order, temporary peace order, or final peace order in
 16 effect at the time of the violation.

19 (a) A person who fails to comply with the relief granted in an interim
 20 protective order under § 4–504.1(c)(1), (2), (3), (4)(i), (7), or (8) of this subtitle, a
 21 temporary protective order under § 4–505(a)(2)(i), (ii), (iii), (iv), (v), or (viii) of this
 22 subtitle, or a final protective order under § 4–506(d)(1), (2), (3), (4), or (5), or (f) of this
 23 subtitle is guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction is subject, for each offense, to:

24 (1) for a first offense, a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or imprisonment not
 25 exceeding 90 days or both; and

26 (2) for a second or subsequent offense, a fine not exceeding \$2,500 or
 27 imprisonment not exceeding 1 year or both.

28 **(B) FOR THE PURPOSE OF SECOND OR SUBSEQUENT OFFENDER**
 29 **PENALTIES PROVIDED UNDER SUBSECTION (A)(2) OF THIS SECTION, A PRIOR**
 30 **CONVICTION UNDER § 3–1508 OF THE COURTS ARTICLE SHALL BE CONSIDERED**
 31 **A CONVICTION UNDER THIS SECTION.**

32 **[(b)] (C)** An officer shall arrest with or without a warrant and take into
 33 custody a person who the officer has probable cause to believe is in violation of an
 34 interim, temporary, or final protective order in effect at the time of the violation.

1 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
2 October 1, 2014.
