1 AN ACT concerning

2 Calvert County – Alcoholic Beverages – Premises Inspections <u>and Penalties</u>

3 FOR the purpose of authorizing the Calvert County Board of License Commissioners, 4 or its designee, to inspect each licensed premises in the county, rather than $\mathbf{5}$ requiring the Board to inspect every licensed premises in the county at least 6 once every 3 months; authorizing the Board of License Commissioners for 7 Calvert County to impose certain fines or suspend an alcoholic beverages license 8 under certain circumstances; authorizing the Board to impose certain penalties 9 if an alcoholic beverages licensee or an employee of the licensee sells alcoholic 10 beverages to a person under the age of 21 years; specifying that certain money 11 collected be deposited into the general fund of the county; requiring the Board to consider certain factors in determining the length of a certain suspension to be 12 13imposed; requiring the Board to impose a fine in accordance with a certain provision of law; making certain stylistic changes; and generally relating to 14 15alcoholic beverages in Calvert County.

5(6)THE BOARD SHALL IMPOSE A FINE UNDER THIS SUBSECTION6IN ACCORDANCE WITH § 10–1001 OF THE STATE GOVERNMENT ARTICLE.

7 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect8 July 1, 2014.
