FISCAL AND POLICY NOTE

Senate Bill 806 Judicial Proceedings (Senator Raskin, et al.)

Criminal Law - Hazing - Penalty

This bill increases the maximum monetary penalty for hazing from \$500 to \$5,000. The bill retains the maximum incarceration penalty for hazing under existing statute (imprisonment for up to six months).

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: Minimal increase in general fund revenues from fines imposed in the District Court. Expenditures are not affected.

Local Effect: Minimal increase in local revenues from fines imposed in circuit court cases. Expenditures are not affected.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: Under the statutory prohibition on hazing, a person may not recklessly or intentionally do an act or create a situation that subjects a student to the risk of serious bodily injury for the purpose of an initiation into a student organization of a school, college, or university. Violators are guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by imprisonment for up to six months and/or a \$500 maximum fine. The implied or express consent of a student to hazing is not a defense.
