A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

Blue Ribbon Commission on Voting, Openness, Transparency, and Equality (VOTE) in Elections

- 4 FOR the purpose of establishing the Blue Ribbon Commission on Voting, Openness, $\mathbf{5}$ Transparency, and Equality (VOTE) in Elections; providing for the composition, 6 chair, and staffing of the Commission; prohibiting a member of the Commission from 7 receiving certain compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain 8 expenses; requiring the Commission to study and make recommendations regarding 9 certain matters; requiring the Commission to report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly on or before a certain 10 11 date; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to the Blue 12Ribbon Commission on Voting, Openness, Transparency, and Equality (VOTE) in Elections. 13
- SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
 That:
- 16 (a) There is a Blue Ribbon Commission on Voting, Openness, Transparency, and 17 Equality (VOTE) in Elections.
- 18 (b) The Commission consists of the following members:
- 19 (1) two members of the Senate of Maryland, one representing each of the 20 principal political parties, appointed by the President of the Senate;
- (2) two members of the House of Delegates, one representing each of the
 principal political parties, appointed by the Speaker of the House;

- (3) the following members appointed by the Governor:

27	(d) The chair of the Commission shall:			

1 be appointed by the Governor; and (1) $\mathbf{2}$ have academic or professional credentials as an expert on election (2)3 reform. 4 The State Board of Elections and the Department of Legislative Services shall (e) provide staff for the Commission. $\mathbf{5}$ 6 (f) A member of the Commission: 7 (1)may not receive compensation as a member of the Commission; but 8 is entitled to reimbursement for expenses under the Standard State (2)9 Travel Regulations, as provided in the State budget. 10 The Commission shall examine ways to encourage broader voter participation (g) 11 and engage new voting populations through a study of the following issues: 12(1)the advantages and disadvantages of: 13 1. open and closed primary elections; and 14"top two" and "top four" primary elections in which the two 2. 15candidates or four candidates with the greatest number of votes advance to the general 16election regardless of party affiliation; 17a system of public campaign financing for offices in the executive, (2)18 legislative, and judicial branches of State government; 19the use of proportional representation voting systems, such as (3)20cumulative voting, preference voting, and instant runoff voting to increase electoral 21competition and representativeness; and 22any other issue that the Commission determines is relevant to (4)23increasing voter participation. 24On or before December 31, 2016, the Commission shall report its findings and (h) 25recommendations to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2-1246 of the State 26Government Article, the General Assembly. 27SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June 1, 2015. It shall remain effective for a period of 2 years and 1 month, and at the end of June 282930, 2017, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be 30 abrogated and of no further force and effect.

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
