A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

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Blue Ribbon Commission on Voting, Openness, Transparency, and Equality (VOTE) in Elections

- 4 FOR the purpose of establishing the Blue Ribbon Commission on Voting, Openness, 5 Transparency, and Equality (VOTE) in Elections; providing for the composition, 6 chair, and staffing of the Commission; prohibiting a member of the Commission from 7 receiving certain compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain 8 expenses; requiring the Commission to study and make recommendations regarding 9 certain matters; requiring the Commission to report its findings recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly on or before a certain 10 11 date; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to the Blue 12 Ribbon Commission on Voting, Openness, Transparency, and Equality (VOTE) in Elections. 13
- SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, 15 That:
- 16 (a) There is a Blue Ribbon Commission on Voting, Openness, Transparency, and 17 Equality (VOTE) in Elections.
 - (b) The Commission consists of the following members:
- 19 (1) two members of the Senate of Maryland, one representing each of the 20 principal political parties, appointed by the President of the Senate;
- 21 (2) two members of the House of Delegates, one representing each of the 22 principal political parties, appointed by the Speaker of the House;
 - (3) the following members appointed by the Governor:

4 5	(e) The State Board of Elections and the Department of Legislative Services shall provide staff for the Commission.
6	(f) A member of the Commission:
7	(1) may not receive compensation as a member of the Commission; but
8 9	(2) is entitled to reimbursement for expenses under the Standard State Travel Regulations, as provided in the State budget.
10 11	(g) The Commission shall examine ways to encourage broader voter participation and engage new voting populations through a study of the following issues:
12	(1) the advantages and disadvantages of:
13	1. open and closed primary elections; and
14 15 16	2. "top two" and "top four" primary elections in which the two candidates or four candidates with the greatest number of votes advance to the general election regardless of party affiliation;
17 18	(2) a system of public campaign financing for offices in the executive, legislative, and judicial branches of State government;
19 20 21	(3) the use of proportional representation voting systems, such as cumulative voting, preference voting, and instant runoff voting to increase electoral competition and representativeness; and
22 23	(4) any other issue that the Commission determines is relevant to increasing voter participation.
24 25 26	(h) On or before December 31, 2016, the Commission shall report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly.
27 28 29	SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June 1, 2015. It shall remain effective for a period of 2 years and 1 month, and at the end of June 30, 2017, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be

abrogated and of no further force and effect.

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
