10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)

Samaritan House Inc. is a Maryland State certified (ADAA level 3.1) nonprofit residential treatment facility for recovering alcohol and drug dependent adult males that has been in operation in Anne Arundel County since 1971. It is only one of two certified programs in the region. Founded by recovering addicts who recognized a great need for residential care, Samaritan House began on West Street in Annapolis, Maryland. After receiving state certification, the Samaritan House moved operations to eight wooded acres in a secluded pocket of the city. In this serene location, clients participate in recovery services and activities under the guidance of a professionally trained staff of five with 24 hour per day supervision to allow for consistent support, safety, accountability and services. Currently Samaritan House serves an average of 76 clients per year with 15-16 clients in residence at any one time. The adjacent sober house residence houses nine clients for extended recovery. Clients are referred from the Anne Arundel County Health Department, related human service agencies, other drug and alcohol treatment facilities, post-incarceration transition facilities, or individual admission.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

To better address the critical need in our community for additional long term residential drug and alcohol treatment and support services, Samaritan House is constructing a Campus of Recovery that will offer a comprehensive model recovery program. The new campus will nearly double our capacity with the addition of 16 beds and extend the continuum of care with new meeting facilities for intensive outpatient counseling programs to meet the continuing care needs of our clients and other community members. The project will be an expansion of our existing 2610 Greenbriar Lane building and infrastructure development and include the adjacent 2608 residential property that is also currently owned by Samaritan House. The County approved the required Site Development Plan and a waiver to proceed to final plan has been approved. The project is being developed in four phases. Phase One, completed in 2014, included planning and development. Phase Two (2015-2016) includes the expansion of property infrastructure, design of the kitchen expansion and annex addition, and construction of a pavilion to provide outdoor meeting space. The kitchen expansion and storm water management system installation will be completed in 2017, during Phase Three. The final phase will conclude in 2018 with the construction of the 16-bed annex building.

Samaritan House offers a full range of support services in the treatment and recovery process for adult males seeking substance abuse services that include, but are not limited to, outpatient treatment, intensive outpatient treatment (IOP) (pending), individual counseling, group counseling, family services & counseling, vocational & job counseling, and life skills counseling. Additionally, Samaritan House provides referrals for services in opiate maintenance therapy, mental health services, government health care programs and other social service programs.

Our goal is to reduce the wait and increase the likelihood of success for those suffering and seeking recovery from substance abuse. To do so, we have embarked on a capital project called the Campus of Recovery that will increase access to treatment and extend the continuum of care through: Construction of a facility to house 16 additional beds for single individuals; Expansion of clinical and administrative facilities and services; and Upgrades to existing facilities to accommodate the expansion.

The Campus of Recovery approach allows Sam House to assist clients in achieving and maintaining long-term sobriety by providing a supportive and nurturing environment of care with a continuum of services housed in one location. The additional 16 beds will enable Samaritan House to meet the residential care and recovery housing needs of an additional 72 adult males per year. After completion, the Campus of Recovery will provide: (1) a sober recovery environment for approximately 150 men annually, (2) a comprehensive and integrated care model that includes residential and outpatient support services; and (3) meeting facilities for a new outpatient and intensive outpatient counseling programs to meet the continuing care needs of our clients and other county residents.

Further, The Campus of Recovery will advance our mission of reintegrating clients into the community as fully functioning members free from the use of alcohol and/or illicit drugs by serving more community members in need with more comprehensive care, improving and expanding services, and strengthening organizational capacity by expanding our resource base and outreach efforts. Fewer people will be put on a waiting list thus preventing a break in the continuum of care when the individual does not have access to residential care, counseling, and relapse prevention. The impact on community resources will be lessened by those suffering from substance abuse, including police, hospital and healthcare systems, as well as jails, prisons, and mental health institutions. The project will help close the gap between treatment rates and the need in the County and mend our current fragmented system of care.
