10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)

Banner Neighborhoods Community Corporation is a community-based nonprofit organization serving the neighborhoods near Patterson Park in Southeast Baltimore City. Founded in 1982, its mission is to promote resident-based leadership, support neighborhood pride and stability, and provide direct services that contribute to the overall viability throughout 10 communities in southeast Baltimore. Banner is a respected leader in the community, collaborating with other organizations on the overall goals of preserving and revitalizing the Patterson Park neighborhoods.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

Banner Neighborhoods plans to renovate a vacant building at 2911 Pulaski Highway in Southeast Baltimore into the Banner Neighborhoods Community Center and relocate its office from its current location at 2900 East Fayette Street. The renovated building will provide office space for Banner, program space for our out-of-school youth programs that serve over 200 children and youth annually; administrative space for our Senior Home Maintenance program that serves 100 senior and disabled homeowners each year; and a community meeting space for the 10 southeast Baltimore City neighborhoods we serve.

28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)

Banner Neighborhoods was created over 30 years ago in 1982, at a time when the neighborhoods around Patterson Park in southeast Baltimore City were experiencing dramatic home owner flight and increasing numbers of vacant houses and occupied homes in deteriorating condition beginning to reflect a lack of investment by their owners. Working in collaboration with other nonprofit organizations in the area who were also trying to stabilize the neighborhoods, Banner Neighborhoods' first focus was a Home Maintenance program whose purpose was to help seniors living on a fixed income to maintain their homes in good repair. Absent Banner's Home Maintenance program, many of these seniors would have had to move away or live in substandard conditions a bad situation for them and a detriment to the health of the neighborhoods.

The Senior Home Maintenance Program continues to this day and still fulfills its original goals of enabling low income seniors, and now disabled home owners, to remain in their homes safely, while helping maintain the housing stock of the neighborhoods in good repair. Over the years, Banner has added other core programs in response to community needs. It has served as an umbrella organization for the neighborhoods around and to the north of Patterson Park, and in this role has listened carefully to community concerns and addressed those concerns through a combination of direct services, linkages to other resources, and grassroots leadership development and organizing.

With a staff of six full-time employees, 2 seasonal employees, 1 Chesapeake Conservation Corps intern and the participation of volunteer coaches and mentors, Banner offers the following programs and activities:

Senior Home Maintenance Program - Allows low income elderly and disabled home owners to maintain their homes in safe and sound condition.

Neighborhood Youth Programs - Year-round, out-of-school enrichment programs serving 200 low income youth.

Growing Green - Running Blue - Environmental stewardship programs undertaken in conjunction with neighborhood associations including sanitation, tree planting and education.

Community Empowerment Initiatives - Community organizing efforts around specific issues, with current emphasis on improving Library Square, Greater Highlandtown and the Monument McElderry Fayette Neighborhood Revitalization Plan.
