10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)

The Weinberg Center for the Arts(WCA) is owned and operated by the City of Frederick under the governance of a board of directors (WCA,Inc) appointed by the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen of the City of Frederick. Built in 1926, the WCA is a 1,157 seat proscenium style performing arts center located in the Historic District of the City of Frederick. The WCA was deeded to the City of Frederick by the Weinberg Family in 1977 and has operated as a performing arts center since 1978.

The mission of the WCA is to "present culturally diverse quality professional arts programs and support local arts organizations by providing a professionally staffed and equipped facility. The WCA accomplishes this mission through the use of three strategies: 1) presentation of diverse programming in dance, theater, film, and music, 2) educational outreach that supports and enhances the curriculum of public, private, and home schools, 3) offering rental of the facility to local arts organizations for the purpose of presenting their productions.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

Since Spring 2013, WCA has been operating essentially without AC in the main theater placing hardships on patrons and performers alike. The lack of AC has severely impacted scheduling at WCA. The decision was made by the City of Frederick to stop the band aid approach that had been the mind set for many administrations and seek bids on an entirely new system design. A combination of public and private support is in place to replace the current system with a more efficient and controllable system. The new system would place self-contained units on the roof of the Weinberg Center for Arts and be gas powered, thus eliminating the need for Freon. The proposed system would offer more control of separate areas of the theater including the stage, be more environmentally friendly.

28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)
During the months of May and June, the Weinberg Center for the Arts hosts 7 community based
dance companies for their annual recitals at reduced rental rates in addition to nationally known
speakers, musicians and performers. Money raised through ticket sales during these recitals allows
non-profit companies to support themselves through the rest of the year. More than 1,000 student
dancers and almost 9,500 patrons have had to suffer through performances in temperatures
reaching 3 digits inside the theater. These conditions are unsafe for all involved and weaken the
Weinbergs reputation within the Greater Frederick community. A new HVAC system is required to
prevent the Weinberg Center for the Arts from closing our doors from May to September.
