Friends of the Library, Montgomery County (FOLMC) was founded in 1982 and incorporated as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, independent organization in 1983. Its mission is to strengthen, promote,

Its mission is to strengthen, promote, support, and advocate for the public library system in order to enrich the lives of area residents and meet the diverse needs of our communities. In support of this mission, FOLMC and its 17 local chapters provide program support (financial as well as volunteer), matching funds, and materials and equipment to augment public resources. FOLMC provides opportunities for citizen philanthropic participation to benefit the public library system.

The Silver Spring Chapter (FOLSS), was formed in 1995 to provide adult programming, which was not then included in the budget for the MC Public Libraries. During the recession, the county cut Summer Reading and other child and youth programs, and FOLSS changed its programming priority to address this need. In recent years, the program focus has been on STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) activities, to support the emphasis on STEM in the public

## 11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

Bond funding will be used to complete an Early Literacy Center in the new Silver Spring Library, scheduled to open in spring 2015. The Center will be a state-of-the art learning space to help children acquire the pre-literacy skills that will lay the foundation for their schoolwork. Comprising a coordinated series of interactive pods, panels, and modules, it will be the first learning space of its kind in the Montgomery County Library system.

The project aims to address a serious need: almost three of ten students who enter kindergarten in Montgomery County are not well prepared in language and literacy. In 2012, some 28% of the county's kindergarten students were found to be not fully ready in the area of language and literacy to start school (Maryland State Board of Education 2012, p. B71). For Hispanic and African American subgroups, which are heavily represented in Silver Spring, the scores were worse: 43% and 31%, respectively, were found to be not fully ready for kindergarten.

Research has shown that the development of early literacy skills in a child's life can better prepare that child for success in reading when he or she enters school.

## 28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)

Phase I of the project (\$110,000) involves three large core installations, with 15 interactive panels and a "house" kiosk puppet place. Phase II of the project (\$110,000) will complete the project with a fourth installation plus additional interactive panels, pods and panels that target the development of specific early literacy skills. Design, shipping, and installation are included in these prices.

Language, reading, and writing evolve from a number of earlier skills, such as alphabet knowledge; phonological awareness and memory; rapid automatic naming of letters or digits, or objects and colors; and print knowledge, among others. These are the areas the Early Literacy Center will target.

Examples of interactive panels included in the Early Literacy Center are: a word wheel (a full alphabet is arrayed on three wheels; children spin each wheel and can make sounds or actual words); a texture match (hand-carved texture pairs, aimed at developing ability to identify and articulate similarities and differences in objects); "How Many Books" magnetic slider board where kids can show how many books they read and the time they read them; and a free-standing world map with coins from each country embedded in the country of use.

For many young children, the public library is their first contact with the world of books and reading. Library staff are ideally suited to inform parents and caregivers about early literacy research. The Early Literacy Center at Silver Spring Public Library will enhance the learning connection between adults and children around literacy. It will offer young children and their families or caregivers a fun, welcoming, interactive, literacy-based learning environment that is not available in homes or elsewhere in the community, and is available free of charge.

Silver Spring Library serves--and will continue to serve in its new space--a large population that is probably the county's most diverse in terms of ethnicity, race, and economic status. According to the 2010 census, District 5 (which includes most of the area within a 5-mile radius of the library) has the highest percentage of minorities and the lowest median household income in the county, yet it ranks third in terms of residents holding graduate degrees.

Given the new library's central location in downtown Silver Spring close to the Metro, as well as on bus routes and the potential future Purple Line, we anticipate that the Early Literacy Center will be well used not only by the local community, but also by residents elsewhere in Montgomery and neighboring counties.
