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Economic Competitiveness and Commerce – Maryland Design Excellence Commission

4 FOR the purpose of establishing the Maryland Design Excellence Commission for certain 5 purposes; establishing that the Commission is in the Maryland Technology 6 Development Corporation; providing for the composition, chair, and staffing of the 7 Commission; prohibiting a member of the Commission from receiving certain 8 compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain expenses; requiring the 9 Commission to study, develop certain plans and programs, and establish certain 10 events regarding design excellence initiatives; requiring the Commission to report 11 its findings, recommendations, and actions taken to the General Assembly on or 12 before a certain date; authorizing the Secretary of Commerce to make a certain 13 recommendation; defining certain terms; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to the Maryland Design Excellence Commission. 14

- October 1, 2016. It shall remain effective for a period of 3 years and, at the end of September
- 19 30, 2019, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be
- abrogated and of no further force and effect.
