A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

- 2 Blue Ribbon Commission on Voting, Openness, Transparency, and Equality (VOTE) in Elections
- FOR the purpose of establishing the Blue Ribbon Commission on Voting, Openness, 4 Transparency, and Equality (VOTE) in Elections; providing for the composition, 5 6 chair, and staffing of the Commission; prohibiting a member of the Commission from 7 receiving certain compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain 8 expenses; requiring the Commission to study and make recommendations regarding 9 certain matters; requiring the Commission to report its findings and 10 recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly on or before a certain date; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to the Blue 11 Ribbon Commission on Voting, Openness, Transparency, and Equality (VOTE) in 12 13 Elections.
- SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, 15 That:
- 16 (a) There is a Blue Ribbon Commission on Voting, Openness, Transparency, and 17 Equality (VOTE) in Elections.
- 18 (b) The Commission consists of the following members:
- 19 (1) two members of the Senate of Maryland, one representing each of the 20 principal political parties, appointed by the President of the Senate;
- 21 (2) two members of the House of Delegates, one representing each of the 22 principal political parties, appointed by the Speaker of the House; and

28 29 30	SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June 1, 2016. It shall remain effective for a period of 2 years and 1 month, and at the end of June 30, 2018, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be			

abrogated and of no further force and effect.

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
