11 12	SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

13 Article – Criminal Law

- 15 (a) A person may not commit an assault.
- 16 (b) Except as provided in subsection (c) of this section, a person who violates 17 subsection (a) of this section is guilty of the misdemeanor of assault in the second degree 18 and on conviction is subject to imprisonment not exceeding 10 years or a fine not exceeding 19 \$2,500 or both.
- 20 (c) (1) In this subsection, "physical injury" means any impairment of physical 21 condition, excluding minor injuries.
- 22 (2) A person may not intentionally cause physical injury to another if the 23 person knows or has reason to know that the other is:



$\frac{1}{2}$	(i) a law enforcement officer engaged in the performance of the officer's official duties;
3 4	(ii) a parole or probation agent engaged in the performance of the agent's official duties; [or]
5 6 7	(iii) a firefighter, an emergency medical technician, a rescue squad member, or any other first responder engaged in providing emergency medical care or rescue services; OR
8	(IV) AN EDUCATOR, AS DEFINED IN § 2–608 OF THE COURTS ARTICLE.

- 10 (3) A person who violates paragraph (2) of this subsection is guilty of the 11 felony of assault in the second degree and on conviction is subject to imprisonment not 12 exceeding 10 years or a fine not exceeding \$5,000 or both.
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect October 1, 2016.
