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### **Next-Generation Scholars of Maryland**

- 3 FOR the purpose of altering certain criteria for the prequalification of a student for a 4 certain grant program; changing the name of the College Readiness Outreach  $\mathbf{5}$ Program to be the Next-Generation Scholars of Maryland Program; altering the 6 purpose and certain requirements of a certain program; establishing a certain pilot 7 program to be administered in certain school systems; requiring certain services to 8 be provided; mandating certain funding for certain years for the pilot program; requiring the State Department of Education and the Maryland Higher Education 9 Commission to submit a certain report on or before a certain date; and generally 10 relating to the Next-Generation Scholars of Maryland Program. 11

# SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

9 (5) THE AMOUNT OF FINANCIAL AID, IN ADDITION TO THE 10 GUARANTEED ACCESS GRANT, THAT PARTICIPATING STUDENTS RECEIVED EACH 11 YEAR THAT THEY WERE ENROLLED IN AN INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION; AND

12 (6) FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS ON THE SUCCESS OF THE 13 PROGRAM AND PILOT PROGRAM AND WHETHER FUNDING FOR THE PILOT 14 PROGRAM SHOULD BE CONTINUED OR EXPANDED.
