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Crimes - Murder in the First Degree - Penalties

- FOR the purpose of providing that a defendant found guilty of murder in the first degree may be sentenced to imprisonment for life without the possibility of parole only if the defendant was a principal in the first degree or a principal in the second degree who willfully, deliberately, and with premeditation intended the death of the victim, was a major participant in the murder, and was actually present at the time and place of the murder; providing for the application of this Act; and generally relating to murder in the first degree.

for life without the possibility of parole.

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- (3) If, within a reasonable time, the jury is unable to agree to imposition of a sentence of imprisonment for life without the possibility of parole, the court shall impose a sentence of imprisonment for life.
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall be construed to apply only prospectively and may not be applied or interpreted to have any effect on or application to any crime committed before the effective date of this Act.
- 7 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 8 October 1, 2016.
