10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)							
Cylburn Arboretum Association, Inc., a 501(c)3 friends group, supports the Arboretum, part of the Baltimore CIty park system, through its mission: maintenance of the gardens, 4 miles of woodland trails, and an extensive educational program focused on nature and cultural arts A summer nature camp for children ages 6-12 is accessible to all through scholarship support.							

Field trips for school-age children, nature enthusiasts, and other visitors are led by volunteer naturalists. The Nature Museum, in the historic Carriage House, displays natural history artifacts native to the Mid-Atlantic Piedmont, and is central to the educational programming. The Association employs an Executive Director and two office staff members, as well as four part-time gardeners. A team of volunteers provides garden and plant care, trail maintenance and staffs programs and other activities.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

The purpose of the project is the rehabilitation and preservation of the historic Carriage House. Built in the 1870's and expanded/rebuilt after a fire in 1912, the Carriage House has deteriorated and has had only emergency repair maintenance for more than a dozen years. The proposed project would stabilize the structure; replace deteriorated plumbing and electrical systems,; add HVAC/insulation to code. Deteriorated wood in the roof, floors and windows would be repaired/replaced and new insulation would achieve energy efficiency. The interior space, now used for storage and the Association's Nature Museum, would be redesigned and rebuilt. The interior design would include new restroom facilities (both inside and outside); an elevator to make the second floor accessible to all; an expanded Nature Museum, doubling its size, offices for the Association on the second floor, and educational meeting space/conference room space.

28. Comments

The Cylburn Arboretum Association is dedicated to connecting the people of the City of Baltimore with nature. One of its major avenues of doing so is through the Nature Museum in the Carriage House. As co-curators with the Baltimore Bird Club of the most complete collection of Maryland Birds, the Association understands the value both educationally and environmentally of the treasure that has been entrusted to it. Because of lack of space, the entire collection is not on display. Because of fairly unsatisfactory environmental conditions within the museum, the collection is threatened. The museum is open for limited periods of time on a regular basis (April through November) or by special request. The space is small and inadequate. With the renovations, the entire collection can be accommodated in the museum; the library currently house in the Mansion would be accessible to all; and instructional space and redesigned exhibit area would provide a modern educational center that would increase visits to the Arboretum and the museum. Educational programming, in particular, could be expanded.

The advantages to the renovation and preservation of this historic site are obvious. The building continues to decline and its future is uncertain. The Association is eager to take on this project to preserve and protect this landmark for future generations.
