Senate Bill 265 (Senator Salling, *et al.*)  
Budget and Taxation

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Gaming - Video Lottery Operation Licensees - Confiscation of Fake  
Identification

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This bill authorizes a video lottery operation licensee to confiscate the identification provided by an individual to gain admittance to a video lottery facility that the licensee determines is fictitious or fraudulently altered.

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Fiscal Summary

**State Effect:** None. The bill codifies existing practice.

**Local Effect:** None.

**Small Business Effect:** None.

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Analysis

**Current Law:** A person may not, with fraudulent intent:

- possess a fictitious or fraudulently altered government identification document;
- display, cause, or allow to be displayed a fictitious or fraudulently altered government identification document;
- lend a government identification document to another or knowingly allow the use of the person's government identification document by another person; or
- display or represent as the person's own a government identification document that was not issued to the person.

A person who violates these provisions is guilty of a misdemeanor and is subject to and/or imprisonment for up to six months and/or a fine of up to \$500.

Except for specified adult video lottery employees, an individual under age 21 is prohibited from (1) playing a table game or video lottery terminal (VLT) in a video lottery facility or (2) entering or remaining in an area within a video lottery facility that is designated for table game or VLT activities. An infraction is a code violation and a civil offense, which subjects an adult violator (1) to the issuance of a citation and a maximum fine of \$100 for a first violation; (2) a \$500 maximum fine for a second violation; and (3) a \$1,000 maximum fine and mandatory participation in gambling addiction treatment for a third or subsequent violation. A minor who violates the prohibition on underage playing of table games or VLTs is subject to juvenile court procedures and dispositions.

A video lottery operation licensee must ensure that individuals under age 21 and intoxicated individuals are not allowed to play table games or VLTs and are not allowed in the area of the video lottery facility where table games or VLTs are located. The State may impose financial penalties on VLT operators.

**Background:** In 2015, there were 11 reported incidents of individuals under age 21 using false identification or someone else's identification to gain entry into a Maryland casino.

Casinos conduct visual inspections of patrons' identification documents and/or use electronic card readers to verify the document. If an identification document is determined to be fraudulent, the individual is denied entry into the area of the video lottery facility where table games or VLTs are located. Most casinos confiscate fictitious or fraudulently altered identification cards, and some casinos send these cards to the Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA) for disposal.

The State Lottery and Gaming Control Agency advises that the vast majority of underage individuals who attempt to enter a gaming facility do so by using another individual's identification card. Casinos typically put those individuals on exclusion lists to bar them from entering all gaming facilities owned by the casino's corporate structure.

MVA advises that any fraudulent identification should be seized. The video lottery operation licensee may contact the police and have the individual cited for using a fraudulent identification, or the licensee can confiscate the identification and send it to the MVA.
